### Williams Court Rent Overcharges Bring Fine and Refunds

Edward Agee owner of properties located at 1472 and 1476 NE Williams Court returned \$304.50 to two tenants by order of the O.P.A. for rent overcharges. Although the houses had been registered with the O.P.A. at \$6.00 to \$15.00 per month over various periods, Agee was charging \$41.00 per month rent. An O.P.A. investigation followed a complaint and Agee was forced to refund the tenants and in addition pay \$152.25 to the U. S. Treasurer, Charles Kaufman, OPA enforcement attorney reported this week.

The two houses carried a maximum legal rent of \$6.00 per mo. up to March 12, 1945 and \$15 per month thereafter. Agee is charged with collecting the \$41.00 per month rent since 1943.

Also included in the OPA report was M. Diducich, Broadway Store located at 200 N. Broadway who was fined \$25.00 for overcharge on fruit.

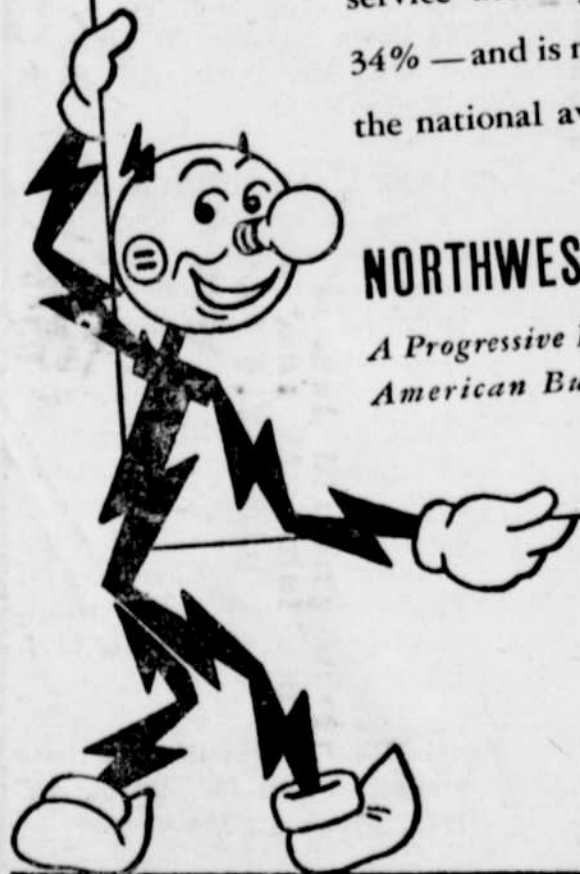
