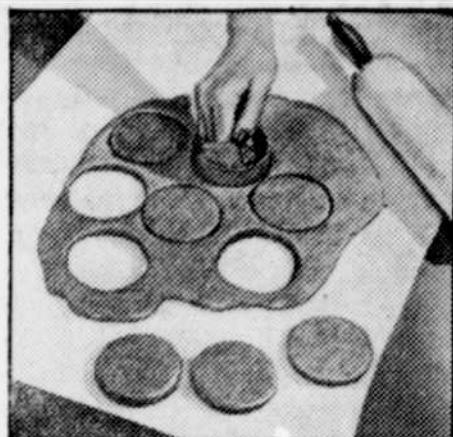

PEANUT BUTTER BISCUITS

2 cups sifted flour 1 teaspoon salt
2 cups baking powder 5 tablespoons Spry
1 cup peanut butter 1 cup milk

Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Cut in Spry fine. Then cut in peanut butter. Add milk, mixing until a soft dough is formed. Knead lightly 20 seconds. Roll to 1/4-inch thickness. Special instruction in tennis under park bureau recreational directors will begin July 1. This will be available at Washington Park Mondays and Wednesdays, 10 to 12 for beginners from 1 to 3 for advanced players, and from 5:30 to 8 p. m. for adults; at Buckman Field Tuesdays and Thursdays, 10 to 12 for junior beginners; 1 to 3 for advanced players; 5:30 to 6:30 for adult beginners, and from 6:30 to 8 p. m. for intermediate adults; at Mt. Tabor Park on Fridays, be- ginners instruction from 10 to 12, and instruction for advanced players from 1 to 3 p. m. Clinics for local park tennis players will be held weekly beginning Satur- day, July 7, at 10 a. m.

For a good many girls and boys of the city—and adults, too, the opening of the park swimming pools is a gala occa- sion. Official opening date this year has been set for June 26. Swimming pools are available to the public at Columbia Creston, Grant, Montavilla, Mt.
