BARBECUED RED HOTS

| | |
|------------------------------------|--------------------------|
| 1 cup Spry | 1 tablespoon chili sauce |
| 2 teaspoons sugar | 2 tablespoons vinegar |
| 1 teaspoon dry mustard | 1 pound hamburger |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | 1 1/2 teaspoons salt |
| 1/4 teaspoon pepper | 1/2 teaspoon onion juice |
| 1 tablespoon onion | 1 teaspoon onion juice |
| 2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce | 8 frankfurters |
| Few drops tabasco sauce | 8 round buns |
| | 8 long rolls |

Blend Spry, sugar, mustard, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper. Combine onion juice, sauces and vinegar. Add liquids to Spry mixture very gradually, mixing well after each addition. Mix hamburger, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, pepper and onion juice. Shape into 8 flat patties to fit buns. Spread both sides of patties and frankfurters liberally with Barbecue Mixture. Broil or fry in hot skillet until well browned all over. Serve between buttered buns or long rolls.

Store remaining Barbecue Mixture in covered container and save for future use.
