

NEW YORK, July 16-Checks totalling \$2,000 have been received by United Negro College Fund headquarters here from Russell Maguire, president of Maguire Industries, Inc.

teaspoon salt teaspoon pepper tablespoon onion juice 2 tablespoons

Few drops tabasco


vinegar pound hamburg teaspoons salt teaspoon pepper teaspoon onion

1 tablespoon chili

8 frankfurters 8 round buns 8 long rolls

Blend Spry, sugar, mustard, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper. Combine onion juice, sauces and vinegar. Add liquids to Spry mixture very gradually, mixing well after each addition.
