and middle west. Portland is one of several cities that will hold meetings on the west coast.

The clinical approach is through community self-surveys of problems and possible spheres of action in the fields of recreation, housing, employment and community resources. The object of the clinic is to have the community understand its problems and to formulate a constructive program, making full use of the available organizations equipped to give direction in easing race tensions.

Dr. Morgan S. Odell, president of Lewis and Clark College, has accepted the chairmanship of the planning committee which will include representatives from the various groups interested directly and indirectly, in improving race relations in this area. Pamphlets and other material giving full information about the clinic will be distributed within a few days.

RESTAURANTS AND HOTELS MAY "BORROW" RED POINTS

Hotels, restaurants and most other institutional users can obtain red point loans from local OPA boards if they have less than 25 per cent of their net point inventory on hand. They may apply through August 31 in writing for loans up to 25 per cent of their red point meal allotment for the July-August period. The loans are to be repaid in four equal installments beginning with the September-October 1945 allotment period.

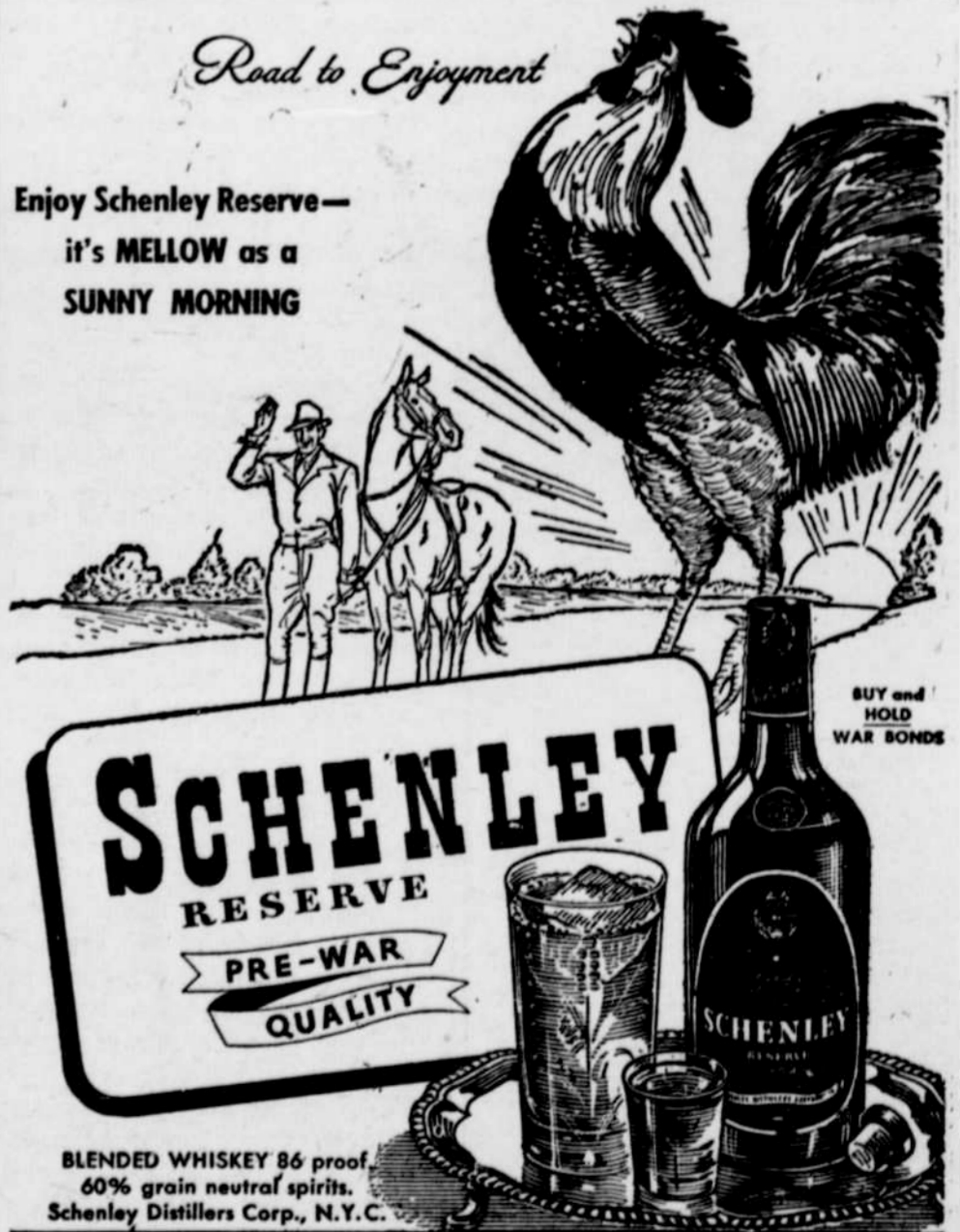
