## BLOOD DONATIONS END ON OFFICIAL V-J DAY

Washington, D. C.—American Red Cross blood donor centers, which have obtained more than 12,250,000 blood donations for the Army and Navy, will cease military operations as of the official V-J Day. However, on the basis of community needs, chapters may now prepare for the operation of civilian blood donor centers. Also, five appointed centers on the west coast may continue to collect the special "O" type of blood for air shipment to the Pacific, until all possibility of need is ended.

## Washing Machines To Return Soon

Household washing machines, ironers, and aluminum kitchenware will be back in the stores this fall at 1942 prices, Price Administrator Chester Bowles has announced. Models will vary in style and price much as they did before the war but manufacturers will be required to tag the pots, pans, shillets, washing machines and ironers with their retail ceiling prices. Manufacturers will be required to turn out the same proportion of low-priced units they made during pre-war years.

## MORE RED STAMPS MADE AVAILABLE

Starting September 1 five more red stamps in ration book 4 will be good for purchase of rationed meats, fats, fish and dairy products through December 31. The new red stamps are: L1, M1, N1, P1 and Q1, each worth 10 points. Red stamps not valid after August 31 are Q2, R2, S2, T2 and U2. Sugar stamp 38 will be good for 5 pounds of sugar on September 1 through December 31. Stamp
