The unit, organized by James M. Reid, news editor, includes full coverage for some 65 members and partial coverage for a number of other employes whose obs are of an executive or confidential nature. The negotiations egan in April and went into efect last week.

Courier workers will receive approximately \$25,000 more in mual pay, Reid said.
