THE VETERANS

The veteran who loses his original discharge papers is apt to suffer a long delay in receiving certain GI benefits. For that reason he should take every precaution to see that they are kept in a safe place and are available at all times, Hugh E. Rossen, director of the state department of veterans' affairs, warned today.

When a veteran applies for and receives his first \$20 check for unemployment under the readjustment allowance, he must take his discharge with him to be stamped by the unemployment compensation commission in the U. S. employment service office where he receives his claim. This stamp gives the date and the place where he first made application.

Recent information discloses that the veteran's discharge also must be stamped to show the amount and type of government guaranty used under the GI loan bill, and the amount, if any, remaining.
