large bowl. Add scalded milk. Stir until Spry is melted and cool un-til lukewarm. Add yeast mixture. Add flour gradually, mixing very thoroughly until a stiff dough is formed. Knead dough on floured board until smooth. Place in bowl

rubbed with Spry. Brush dough with Spry, cover, and let rise in warm place until double in bulk (about 2 hours).

Divide dough into 2 parts. Roll into 2 rectangles, 7 x 15 inches and ¼ inch thick. Sprinkle each rectangle with ½ teaspoon cinnamon. Roll like a jelly roll and seal edges. Place in Spry-coated bread pans (8½ x 5½ inches). Have sealed edge on bottom of pan. Let rise until double in bulk (about 1 hour).

Bake in hot oven (425°F.) 15 min-

utes, then reduce heat to moderately hot oven (375°F.) and bake 30-35 minutes longer. Remove from pans and brush crusts with Spry. Makes 2 loaves.
