After an illness of several months with the dreaded disease consumption, death came to her relief and Mrs. C. L. Wyman quietly passed away on Friday, Aug. 5th. Mrs. Wyman leaves a husband, five little children and many friends to mourn her loss. The funeral will take place at 2 o'clock to-day.

The practice of putting out fire in the mountains is one that should be stopped, and should receive the attention of officials everywhere. Several heavy fires are raging in the Cascades, destroying a vast amount of timber and injuring the range. If a few parties who start these fires were punished others would be more careful.

FATAL SHOOTING AFFRAY.

Oliver Connet Shoots and Kills Wm. Turner.

Last Wednesday morning Oliver Connet, a rail maker, shot Wm. Turner on Veese creek, about

miles from Prineville, from wounds from which Mr. Turner died within a few hours.

Justice Bell summoned a coroner's jury and held an inquest over the dead body Thursday morning. Following is the verdict:

We, the jury empaneled to enquire into the cause of the death of the dead body now lying before us, find that his name is William Turner, aged 23 years, and that deceased came to his death from

gun shot wound in the left side from a 38 caliber pistol in the hands of Oliver Connet, committed on the 3d day of August, 1887, in Crook county, Oregon.

A warrant was sworn out in Justice Bell's court for the arrest of Connet and he was arrested and brought into town Wednesday by Deputy Sheriff Combs.

The circumstances of the shooting, as shown by the evidence produced at the preliminary examination before Justice Bell on Thursday, are as follows:

Connet and John Linville had some time since made some agreement as to lines over which Mr. Linville's sheep should be herded.

On the morning of the shooting, Mr. Linville's son, William, and Turner were herding the sheep near Connet's house and allowed them to cross the line over which they were not to be herded.

Connet came out and began throwing rocks at the sheep to drive them away, when young Linville came up and ordered him to quit. After some quarreling the two separated, Linville going to Turner and Connet starting toward his house and still throwing at the sheep. Turner seeing this, told Linville if he would give him his pistol he (Turner) would go and make Connet stop.

Turner took the pistol and followed Connet some distance, and when he overtook him leveled the pistol and told Connet to quit rocking the sheep or he would shoot. Connet dropped to his knees, drew his pistol and shot, at the same time knocking Turner's pistol out of his hand. The two men clinched, and Linville ran up and knocked Connet down, then Turner and Linville started for their camp, but Turner soon became exhausted and fell. He died within a few hours after the shooting.

The only witnesses examined were Linville and Connet, the defendant, and their statements were substantially the same. After hearing the evidence Justice Bell discharged the defendant.

Turner was a comparative stranger here, having herded sheep for several different sheep raisers in the county, but no one seems to know much of him. The remains were interred in Mill creek cemetery Thursday.

Suddenly Ended.

As might have been expected, Abe Blackburn, the alleged ringleader of the mob who looted Kelly, was able to prove an alibi at the preliminary examination the justice's court at Dallas Tuesday of last week. Thus is probably ended the attempt on the part of the civil authorities to punish those who saw fit to take the law in their own hands and meet out justice according to their own ideas.

School Matters.

At a meeting of the board of directors of Prineville school district last Wednesday evening Prof. G. A. Stanley, late of Greenwood, Miss.

Stanley, was employed as principal of the school to begin sometime in October next. Mr. G. W. Slayton was employed as first assistant teacher. The teacher of the primary department has not been selected, the directors not being able to determine upon a selection from among the various applicants.

Prof. Stanley is a brother of Prof. T. Stanley, president of the state normal school at Monmouth, and comes highly recommended, as an educator, and we believe he will fill the position to which he has been selected. Mr. Slayton is well known in this vicinity. He has given entire satisfaction in the schools he has taught in the county.

While in San Francisco H. Hahn will buy the necessary apparatus for the different school rooms, consisting of maps, charts, globes, etc., all of which will be of the most approved patterns. So with a good school house, good apparatus and able teachers there is nothing to hinder the Prineville school being equal to any in the state.

Material for the school house is being laid on the ground, and the work of construction will begin next week. The contractor, Mr. Belknap, expects to have the building completed by the specified time, October 8th, and school will probably begin by the 17th.
