Sec. 1. The manufacture, sile, or the giving away, or the obering to sell or give away, or the obering to sell or give away, or the keeping for sile, of any puritions, vinous, mail, distilled, fermented, or may intoxicating liquers whatever, is prohibited in this state, except for medicinal, scientific or mechanical purposes.

Sec. 2. The legislative assembly shall provide by law in what manner, by whom, and at what place such liquors, or any of them, shall be manufactured or seld, or kept for sile for medicinal, scientific or mechanical purposes.

Sec. 3. This amendment shall take effect and be in full force in six months from the date of its ratification by the election.

Sec. 4. The legislative assembly shall without delay pass all necessary laws with sufficient penaltics necessary to enforce this amendment.
