THE REPUBLICAN TICKET.

The republicans of Crook county have placed a ticket in the field for the approval of the voters, and the criticism of the public generally; and being one of the public we deem it our privilege to make such comments upon the republican nominees as may be befitting. While the REVIEW intends to work for the success of the democratic state and county ticket, it will do so in what it believes to be a fair and journalistic manner. The gentlemen who compose the republican ticket are nearly all our personal friends in the social and business walks of life, and during the campaign, though we shall oppose them politically, we shall endeavor to do so in a friendly manner, and their moral characters shall be held as sacred by us as though they were not aspirants for official honors; but their public acts are public property and are proper subjects for criticism; their qualifications for the positions to which they aspire are also open to discussion, and we hold it is our duty and privilege to call them in question. What we say at present in reviewing the ticket, or what shall be said in the future, will be confined within these limits.

HON. J. N. WILLIAMSON, the nominee for representative, is our present sheriff, an office he has held nearly two years, and has acquitted himself creditably. Mr. Williamson has made a good sheriff; he is a straightforward republican, and a believer in the fallacies of a protective tariff. As a suitable candidate for sheriff we would say M. Williamson was well suited, but as an advocate of the people in the halls of the legislature he would not be our choice, even were he of the right political faith.

The candidate for sheriff, JOHN COMBS, is a Crook county boy, having spent the greater portion of his life within its bounds, and is well liked by everybody. He served as deputy under both Sheriff Williamson and Sheriff Blakely, and the experience he gained while acting as deputy has made his qualifications unquestionable.

H. A. DILLARD, for county clerk, was a good selection. Mr. Dillard is well and favorably known to nearly all the old settlers of the county, having for a number of years been editor of the Prineville News, during a portion of which time he was also county school superintendent.

E. R. GARY, received the nomination for treasurer. No better choice could have been made. Mr. Gary is a gentleman against whom nothing can be said; he is a gentleman in every respect, and in whom everyone has the utmost confidence.

GEO. W. RIDGWAY, has only been a resident of the county about nine months, and it is quite reasonable to suppose his knowledge of the valuations of property in this section is limited, though as to his personal qualifications we know nothing.

C. A. GRAVES was re-nominated for surveyor. Mr. Graves is the present incumbent of that office, and during the time he has filled the position he has proven himself a practical surveyor of no small ability. His competency as an officer is unquestioned, and his past official acts will be a recommendation to him in the coming contest.

The nominee for the office of school superintendent, DR. H. P. BELKNAP, is a gentleman of sterling qualities and has risen to eminence in his profession. Dr. Belknap is a physician whom everybody respects; he has made medicine his study, and its practice the object of his life. He has never been a teacher, and his calling being so far removed from that of the educational branches, which, as superintendent, he would be called upon to preside over, we conclude his qualifications for that office are lacking. Personally, Dr. Belknap is one of our warmest friends, and there is not a man in the county whom we would prefer seeing rewarded with official honors than he, but the educational interests of the county are of too much importance to allow them to be considered lightly, hence we do not deem it advisable to place anyone at the head of that branch of the county affairs who is not thoroughly qualified.

DR. V. GESSNER, the choice of the republicans for coroner, is an old resident of Prineville and one of our most highly respected citizens. He requires no introduction to the public, for what anyone might say for or against him would not detract from the high esteem with which he is held in the county.

The nominees for county commissioners are W. C. PLUMMER and Z. T. KEYS. Both are good, honest, straightforward farmers. Mr. Plummer is a resident of Upper Crooked river, and though upright in his dealings with men, has not the personal qualifications of an efficient commissioner. His experience in business life has been too limited to fit him for the position. Mr. Keys is a resident of Mitchell precinct, and a prosperous sheep raiser who has made a success of his own business. What other qualifications he has we are unable to say.

A careful review of the ticket will convince almost any voter that it is not a strong one by any means, not one that will command the undivided support of the republican party, or draw heavily upon the democratic forces. True, it is composed principally of good, honest, straightforward men, some of them perfectly competent to fill any position of honor and trust, yet there some who are incompetent, and their weakness must detract from the strength of those who are. It is by no means so strong a ticket as we expected to see, nor one at which the democrats need take fright.
