Last Monday Cox Bros. started nine horses to Albany for sale. They were fine young geldings, and will be no discredit to the stock of Crook county when placed on the market.

The Review was mistaken in stating last week that all the wool in Crook county had been shipped. Several loads of wool have passed through town this week en route to The Dalles.

Evidence in the water right case between J. P. Combs and S. R. Slayton is being taken before the county clerk. J. F. Moore is attorney for plaintiff and G. W. Barnes for defendant.

J. M. Taylor and family, of Bridge creek, passed through town Thursday en route to Portland. Mr. Taylor's health is very poor, and he is going to Drs. Darrin, of Portland for treatment.

Joe Crooks and family returned last week from a visit to Brownsville. Mr. Crooks says times are flourishing, the grain and hay crop being good and the farmers expect to realize good prices.

Last Saturday Strand Price was down from his ranch on Camp creek. He says crops have been fairly good on Camp creek this season, much better than those on Ochoco and Crooked river.

Superintendent Slayton is preparing a map of the county, locating boundaries of school districts, etc. Clerks of the various school districts in the county are requested to trace out the boundary lines of their districts and be prepared to furnish the superintendent all needed information regarding them.

Jack Summers and family have gone to Mt. Hood to recreate. Billy Summers has taken Jack's place in the store during his absence.

The oldest citizen says the water in Crooked river is lower than he has ever before seen it. Water has become so scarce that it is so impregnated with Alkali that mosquitoes won't breed in it.

J. C. Abbott and W. H. Frazier arrived from below on Wednesday. Contrary to our expectations and fondest hopes, Mr. Frazier came home without an angel to preside over his household.

R. Rowan returned last Sunday from the Sound country, where he had been visiting his daughter. Mr. Rowan reports having had poor health during his visit, the sea breeze not having agreed with his rheumatism.

"Judge Sumner and family and Miss Holbert, 'Squire Bell and Wm. Shella-barger returned from Crane prairie on the Deschutes last Monday. They report the water very low in the prairie and the grass drying up.

Walter Brown, accompanied by his sister, Mrs. C. W. Elkins of Beaver, went through town Wednesday, going to Albany. Mrs. Elkins has been in poor health for some time, and is going below for medical treatment.

The Hampton Bros. have written to parties here wanting to buy 200 beef cattle for the Sound market. Wm. Foster started on Wednesday for his cattle range on Beaver and will probably be able to gather enough to fill their order.

The Lebanon Express reports that two Salemites who had been rusticated in the mountains got in such a hurry that they walked 82 miles in 5 hours, 20 minutes and 2 seconds. They must have taken a "bar" up in the mountains.

T. M. Baldwin and Z. M. Brown with their families started this week for Brownburg, Jackson county, to visit Mr. Baldwin's and Mrs. Brown's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Baldwin. They expect to be gone a month or six weeks.

The Grant Co. News says Mac Sommer-ville got so excited over reading the account of the Sullivan-Kilrain fight that he imagined himself a pugilist and executed a pugilistic feat upon John Hyde, for which he paid Grant county \$20. Both parties are well known here.

Died—In Prineville on Saturday, July 27th, Perry Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Davis. The funeral services were held at Union Church on Sunday at 11 a. m., conducted by Rev. F. R. Spaulding. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of the entire community.

Linn Woods and Ed White are again at their posts of duty, having returned from the health resorts on the McKenzie. The water of the medical springs over there seems to have had a good effect, for both these gentlemen have somewhat of a ruddier appearance than when they went away.

John Nutting, Bob Herrington and A. Roberts returned on Wednesday from a search in the northeastern part of the county for the remains of George Nutting. They were unable to find any traces of the missing man. They intend continuing their search until something definite regarding his disappearance is learned.

One of the Roseburg papers contains an order from the secretary of state directing the stock inspector of Douglas county to kill and dispose of certain described horses belonging in his jurisdiction. This order is made by virtue of the law to prevent the spreading of infectious and contagious disease among domestic animals.

The case between J. P. Combs and S. R. Slayton, contesting water rights, (evidence in which is now being taken before the county clerk) is one in which a majority of the settlers of Crook county is interested. In this state there is little statutory provision regarding water rights, especially for irrigating purposes, and the decision in this case will at least establish a precedent in such matters.

The people here have been complaining of the weather being oppressively hot, but their neighbors over in Willamette valley have more cause of complaint. Wells Bell, who is visiting in Benton county, writes home that the thermometer has registered 105 degrees in the shade. Owing to the difference in the altitude, 105 degrees there would be more oppressive than 110 here.

Some time since B. F. Allen and L. C. Cline took evidence in a land contest case before the county clerk. The case was submitted to the land office at The Dalles, and a decision has been rendered in favor of Cline. It was a case wherein Allen was holding under the desert land act and Cline had taken the land as a pre-emption. The land office ruled that it was not desert land, therefore was subject to entry under the pre-emption laws.

It is an old saying that "to make a success in raising hogs, the raiser must be a hog, also." We don't know how it would be here, probably this is the case on the other side of the mountains. But in this county the question of hogs running at large has been voted upon by the people and a very large "NO" was the result. In brief, the melancholy fact is, that this compels hog-raisers to keep their hogs at home.

Owing to the planer having shut down, on account of the scarcity of water, the progress of constructing the new church has been somewhat impeded, as much of the work that would have been done by machinery has now to be done by hand. Nevertheless the contractor, Mr. Belknap, is pushing the work as rapidly as possible, and has the building enclosed.

The building thus far presents quite an imposing appearance, and when completed will be a structure to which all of Prineville can look with pride.

A sad incident occurred here on Friday of last week. A lady and gentleman named Allen were traveling from California to Washington, and while on the desert their little son took sick and died at Farewell Bend, before medical aid could be reached. The bereaved parents

arrived here on Friday, and the remains of their little boy were laid to rest in Prineville cemetery Saturday. It is ever sad to give up loved ones, but to have to lay them away among strangers and in a strange land makes the grief doubly hard to bear.

Prineville has been unusually free from sneak-thieves and burglars, but one has at last made his appearance in town, and for some time has been picking up articles of small value—flour, chickens, wood, etc. Last Sunday night he effected an entrance into Uren & Childs' warehouse at the rear of this office, but was scared away before he got his hands on anything of value, at least nothing was missed. If somebody would fill his carcass with bird shot, it would stop his pilfering career, and also serve as a warning to others who have a desire to steal.

The moralist now has a subject for a lecture in the persons of Dave Stewart and Joe Howard. Both occupy high positions in the community as honorable citizens, but "Uncle" John Williamson the other day thought they were inexcusably careless. They were returning from a pleasure trip on the Deschutes and got one of their horse's heads into Mr. Williamson's halter. The horse wore it to town, neither of the gentlemen discovering the mistake until called upon to deliver the halter. Both gentlemen were chagrined to think they had thus imposed on an old man like Mr. W.

Bill Nye writes from Paris to the S. F. Examiner that while crossing the Atlantic he fell in company with a very loquacious American gentleman, who had taken the precaution to engage a room in Paris a month ahead of his arrival, and all the way across the ocean bewailed Bill's lack of forethought in not doing likewise, fearing that William would have to sleep in the street. But when they arrived at the gay city it was Bill's turn to bewail his companion's forethought, for he had a month's board bill to pay, while Bill got the adjoining room, with board bill commencing at the date of arrival. From Nye's description of his companion, there is little doubt he is the Ochoco Review's traveling correspondent.

High-Prized Grain.
It is likely that seed grain and feed of all kinds will bring rousing high prices for the next twelve months. The local market is spoken of here. Though, as far as heard from, grain is turning out better than was expected. But many have failed to raise any grain at all, cutting their entire crops for hay. Hay will be plentiful. Some people talk of going to the Willamette valley for seed grain and feed. In cases where it must be had this may be done, but grain cannot be freighted over the Cascades from the valley for less than 3 cents a pound, maybe not for that. Thus it can be seen what such prices would make oats and wheat bring.

At present prices it would make wheat worth about \$2.50 a bushel, and oats not less than \$1.30 per bushel. At these rates we predict very few oats will be hauled from the Willamette valley, and no wheat at all—not for speculative purposes at least.

Smoky Weather.
This is no literary effort on Indian summer, but a straightforward statement to the effect that we, also, are having very smoky weather. Other newspapers seem not to have lost sight of the fact that more or less smoke is to be seen in the atmosphere in their respective localities, and we want it known that the same phenomenon is observable here. It seems to be the general opinion that there is a fire somewhere in the mountains. At any rate the camp-fire builder, or neglecter, as the case seems to be, is charged up with the cause of these forest fires. In some cases, and perhaps in many cases, this may be true, but why not say that lightning set fire to the trees and thus caused the trouble that is charged against the poor traveler who has trouble enough anyway? Besides, the lightning causes two fires to the camper's one, any way.

An Honored Visit.
Last Wednesday we felt ourselves honored by a call from a lone sea gull from the far away Pacific. The bird appeared on a mound of sawdust near the mill. Our stranger friend staid about all the afternoon, and seemed quite tame, so tame that as I tossed crumbs to it, it would come within a few feet of me and pick them up. This strange bird was a great curiosity to some, but to those of us who are familiar with the ocean it seemed a messenger of good tidings from our far distant home on the sea. A. M. Improving Cattle.
Two years ago J. J. Brown, of Hardin, imported a number of Hereford bulls and heifers from Missouri. He turned the bulls on the range with his herd of common cattle, and he says about one-half of this year's crop of calves are ball-faced, showing marked points of the Hereford. The half and quarter breed Hereford calves, Mr. Brown says, can easily be picked out among the herd, and show a marked improvement over the common stock. He thinks the Herefords are well adapted to the feed and climate of this country, being a hardy breed of cattle, and will subsist on very little feed, and stand the cold weather better than "scrubs." Of course Mr. Brown does not expect to derive much direct benefit at once from breeding his cattle up, but when he markets this year's crop of calves he will not doubt get better prices than those who are breeding scrubs. The time has been when there was no inducement to breed fine cattle, when beef sold by the head, or according to age, but since it is sold by the pound, breeders must raise heavier cattle, and those who begin now to breed up their stock will reap the benefit soonest.

Our Public School.
About the first of September our public school will begin on the fall term, and although a new corps of teachers will be in charge, yet we have every assurance that the directors will see that the high reputation of the Prineville school shall be maintained. We are justly proud of this important public institution. In the past it has been the means of adding considerably to our substantial population during nine months in the year, for it is not only a district school, but it also offers the advantages of a graded school, and is largely patronized by people living in various and remote parts of the county. Prof. Stanley and Mr. Slayton, who have had charge of first grade and intermediate departments, respectively, are going east to spend the winter, but it is understood that Miss Wigle, who is much esteemed by all the patrons of the primary department, will be retained. We are told that experienced teachers will be employed, thus assuring all who may wish to take advantage of the excellent school privileges offered, that the high standard of the school will be kept up. The date for the school to open has not yet been set, that we know of, but it will be early in September.

State School Fund.
The state officers have made the apportionment among the several counties of the interest on the permanent school fund. It amounts to \$130,377.20, and the number of school children in the state is 93,098. The apportionment gives \$1.40 to each scholar. Crook county is credited with 1242 school children, and is allowed \$1,738.80 of the state fund.

Hardin Items.
July 25, 1889.
Harvesting is in full blast. More hay and grain will be put up than was expected.

Thunder showers every day last week, causing the grangers to use language that is seldom found in print.

Cal Geer and family, of Silverton, passed through here en route to Harney valley. Mr. Geer will locate in Eastern Oregon, but wishes to satisfy himself as to the best locality.

Tom Spafford has raised a large crop of mosquitoes by his thorough irrigation. He says they equal the celebrated Jersey "squeeters."

There is some talk of the settlers at the head of Crooked river fencing it up, which would drive most of the stock off this range, as the water is scarce now.

A. O. Bodell and family, of Buck creek, have moved to Idaho, starting last Wednesday. PAT.

NOTES AND NEWS.
Heavy forest fires have been raging in Montana the past week.

The drygoods firm of Lewis Bros. & Co. of New York has failed. Liabilities, \$5,000,000.

A disastrous storm occurred in Chicago on the 28th, prostrating telegraph wires and flooding a portion of the city.

American wheat is in greater demand in London and Liverpool markets than it has been during the last ten years.

The recent election in France has resulted in a decided victory for the republic, Boulanger having been overwhelmingly defeated.

Fire bugs have been operating in Walla Walla, and the citizens have organized a committee of safety. All suspicious characters will be made leave the city.

The Oregon Pacific managers have determined to abandon the 400-foot tunnel in the Cascades, having discovered a way by which they can pass around the mountain by light work. It is reported Antone & Doe have 300 men employed on their contract, and will on put more force in a short time.

A south-bound train on the S. P. jumped the track two miles south of Albany on the 25th. The accident was caused by a switch being left partly open. The engine and tender were wrecked, and the engineer badly scalded. No passengers were severely injured, but many of them were considerably bruised.

The handsome brick packing house of the Colfax Packing Company was almost entirely destroyed by fire on the 25th. In the building were 7000 pounds of bacon and several tons of lard, most of which is damaged. The brick walls remain intact. It is not known how the fire started, but was either incendiary or caught from sparks from the foundry, near by. The loss is \$14,000, insurance \$6000.

The Paris exposition will be kept open until October. A general election for a new chamber of deputies will then be held. The object of the French ministry is keeping the great exhibit open until that time to absorb the thoughts of the people outside of politics so that dangerous agitation shall not precede the election. The active and vivacious Frenchman must have something to get excited about, and while it is the exhibition, it is not Boulanger and politics.

The bed of the Santa Anna river in California is dry and dusty. But it has been found that from fifteen to twenty-five feet below the surface the river is running in full flow. Taking advantage of this, the people are tunneling under the river bed and carrying out canals to irrigate thousands of acres of adjacent land. The water is not like the water which flows in the stream in the spring, but seems to be artesian water of the very finest quality.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue Mason has made a preliminary report of the operations of the internal revenue service for the fiscal year ended June 30 last. Total collections were \$130,895,458, an increase over 1888 of \$6,568,957. The cost of collections for the fiscal year just ended will aggregate about \$4,185,000, being a fraction less than 3.2 per cent., which is exactly the same of 18-88. Total receipts during the year from different taxations were: Spirits, \$74,313,206, an increase of \$5,007,039 over the previous fiscal year; tobacco, \$31,866,860, an increase of \$1,204,429; fermented liquors, \$23,723,835, an increase of \$399,617; oleomargarine, \$894,248, an increase of \$30,108; banks and bankers, \$6240, an increase of \$2011; miscellaneous, \$91,069, a decrease of \$74,248. Illinois paid the highest internal revenue tax of any state, amounting to \$31,007,419.
