

JUDICIAL BRADSHAW.

The Heppner case has many pleasant things to say of Judge Bradshaw, and most heartily endorses him and recommends that the voters of this district support and elect him to the office he now holds by virtue of the governor's appointment. It has this to say of the judge:

"For men at the age of 62 attain the honorific distinction of filling the circuit judgeship. No better credentials of ability and worthiness need be offered from a young man than the testimony of his appointment thus early in life to expanded the equities of law from responsible a position. When a young man is given to a position of trust and responsibility it is because innate ability, coupled with adequate qualifications, single him out for such duties. From every quarter of the seventh judicial district have come the most cordial expressions of endorsement for Judge W. L. Bradshaw. Having served a year with entire satisfaction, his nomination to a continuance in the office has failed to call forth a single adverse criticism from whatever party.
