A. Hackleman arrived last Monday from Albany, having 375 head of cattle which he had driven across the mountains, and has driven them to his ranch on Camp creek. Mr. Hackleman said the snow had about all gone out of the mountains, but the roads were quite muddy on the west side. He reported crop prospects good in the valley.

Large Wool Receipts.

The receipts of wool at Moody's warehouse are larger than at any time of the previous season, and the clip has come from Crook, Grant, Lake and Harney counties. Every available nook in the large building is filled with sacks, and there is not standing room on any of the platforms. The immense amount of the clip of Eastern Oregon which this warehouse has received is astonishing to those who are not acquainted with the rich country in all natural productions that the Dalles is tributary. It is no object to make a daily item of the usual receipts, because for the past month, not a day has passed that a force of a dozen employees have not been engaged handling sacks from the country and piling them to the rafters and on every available foot of room, and also in shipping to the east. The prices have an upward tendency today, and the quotations are 13 1/2c to 15 1/2c cents a pound. At the end of the season we shall publish the amount received, and we are fully satisfied this will surpass any former year by a million pounds.—Times-Mountaineer.

Good Country for Stage Robbers.

Lake and Klamath counties seem to be a hot bed for stage robbers, at least numerous robberies have been perpetrated in those counties within the past few years. There must be something in the climate down there that makes the people bold, bad highwaymen. The last feat in this line was performed on Thursday of last week. Two masked men held up the stage half way between Klamath and Lakeview and robbed Wells, Fargo & Co's, express box. It is supposed they got considerable money. At last accounts they had not been captured.

Wages of Farm Laborers.

The statistician of the U. S. department of agriculture has prepared a report which is now in press, on the wages of farm labor, the result of him investigations from 1880 to 1902, with prior records of wages as far back as 1850. The report shows the monthly rate both with and without board for the season or year and also by the day in harvest time. It shows that for ten years wages have been very uniform and well sustained in spite of fluctuations in farm products, and that a steady demand exists, with a positive scarcity of farm labor in a large portion of the country.

Went up in the Sky.

The balloon ascension and the parachute jump last Saturday evening was a pronounced success taking everything into consideration. While the ascension would have been better appreciated had it been lighter, no blame was attributed to the operators, the wind alone being in fault, it being so strong that the flight in the skies could not be successfully made until the shades of darkness had approached. However the ascension looked very diminutive before he reversed his connection with the balloon and began his descent to terra firma with the aid of the parachute, which, to the anxious, excited spectators, seemed as though it would fall in performing its function of inflating when the descent began, the aerial flyer having fallen for the first few hundred feet at a pace that would shame a motorist, but about the time the spectators had begun to wonder if he would pass on through the earth when he struck, the thing swelled out like a ward policeman and gracefully landed its passenger in the top of an obnoxious willow about a mile east of town. The ascensions that will be made here on the 2d, 3d and 4th will surpass that of Saturday, as a more propitious time will be chosen for the ethereal voyage.
