O'REILLY KILLED.

D. L. Bruner Bound over to Await the Action of the Next Grand Jury.

Last week we gave to our readers what little that could be gathered in reference to the killing of O'Reilly near Ashwood. Thomas O'Reilly of the firm of Oregon & O'Reilly was instantly killed by D. L. Bruner, on the morning of the 4th inst. Bruner was a sheepherder in the employ of the Prineville Land & Live Stock Company. The details of the terrible tragedy are about as follows:

The company for whom Bruner is working have two ranches on Black rock gulch about 12 miles northeast of Ashwood. O'Reilly has a homestead on a small strip of land lying between the two ranches. On each of these two ranches the company had a band of sheep and O'Reilly was herding one from his place. On the morning of the 4th, Bruner took his sheep out and it seems they were about to "mix up" with O'Reilly's band. So O'Reilly takes his rifle and went over to where Bruner was and at this point there was some slight difference in the stories of the tragedy. John Oregon, O'Reilly's partner saw the deed committed but he was some distance away, possibly 700 yards. Bruner and O'Reilly walked along for some distance when Bruner pulled his pistol and shot O'Reilly through the left arm just above the elbow. This knocked the rifle out of O'Reilly's hand and he started down the hill running as fast as he could. Bruner picks up O'Reilly's gun and from shells found, must have shot three times. The last shot striking O'Reilly in the center of the back of the head and came out in the center of the forehead. It was 183 yards from the spot where O'Reilly dropped his gun to where he fell and Bruner was 125 yards from him, having advanced on the fleeing man 58 yards. Bruner says that O'Reilly attempted to draw on him and he shot in self-defense.

Bruner took the rifle and left for the company's headquarters and was there when Sheriff Connelton put in appearance and was awaiting that of ficers coming. Justice Childers held an inquest on Friday, and the following was the verdict of the coroners jury:

In the matter of the inquest upon the body of Thomas O'Reilly held before T. L. Childers, justice of the peace, for Upper Trout precinct, Crook County, Oregon, on April 5, 1901:

We, the undersigned jury of inquisition in the above entitled matter find that the deceased was Thomas O'Reilly, aged 26 years; a native of Ireland; that he came to his death on his homestead in Crook county, Oregon, on April 4, 1901, from the effect of a gunshot wound in the head inflicted by D. Bruner and that said D. Bruner fired said shot or shots at said Thomas O'Reilly purposely and by deliberate and premeditated malice, killed said Thomas O'Reilly, said gunshot wound being caused by a shot or shots from a gun held by said D. Bruner in Crook county, Oregon, on April 4, 1901.

On the evidence given before him as acting coroner, Justice Childers bound Bruner over to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of murder.

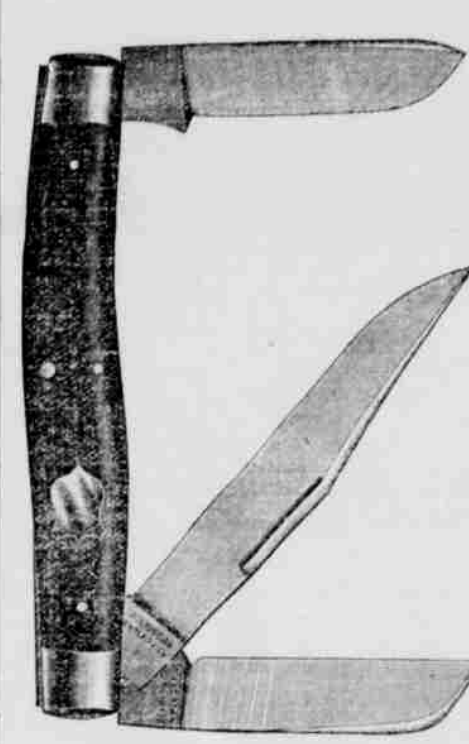

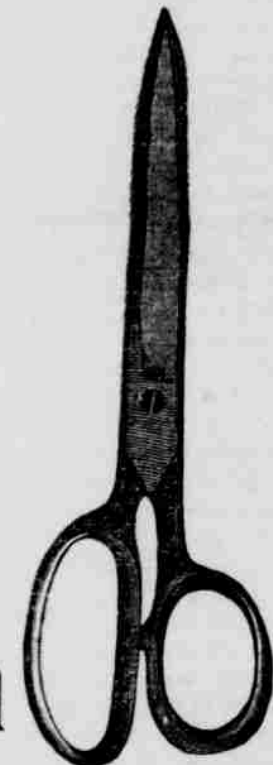
