POSSIBILITIES OF CROOK COUNTY UNDER THE CAREYLAND ACTS.

Congress passed a law in 1804 granting to the arid land states 1,000,000 acres each of desert or arid lands under certain conditions set forth in the act...

Under the law, the state must first file with the department maps showing the lands selected, the source and volume of the water supply, the plan of irrigation, reservoir sites, etc.

This is the plan in brief. No serious objections to the scheme are apparent. On the other hand applying it to Crook county, a great deal may be said in its favor.

There are at least a half million acres of desert in this county. Some of it can and will be reclaimed by private enterprise.

PROFITABLE ALFALFA GROWING.

It is often stated that Crook county will produce so much alfalfa that it will be marketed at a profit...

As an illustration of what may be and is being done in this line we mention the following instance. Last year Bolter & Crum on Loxe Trout purchased several hundred head of cattle, paying good prices...

When it is considered that one acre of alfalfa produces from four to five tons which bring \$7 a ton it is clear that the business is exceedingly profitable...

Careful calculation, shows that wheat lands which are rated at \$10 to \$15 per acre return not more than ten per cent profit on the valuation. On the same basis alfalfa lands are worth not less than \$200 an acre.
