County Court Proceedings.

At the regular Jan., 1901, term of the commissioners court for the county of Crook when were present Wm. C. Willis, county judge, D. E. Templeton and J. H. Healy, commissioners, the following proceedings were had of record:

Ordered that a warrant in the sum of \$6.69 be drawn in favor of H. A. Melvin as rebate on taxes wrongfully paid.

Ordered that a warrant be drawn in favor of W. T. Casey for the sum of \$15.30 as costs recovered by him in case of W. T. Casey vs Crook County.

The jury list, consisting of 200 names were selected and names furnished to clerk.

In the matter of the tax levy for the year 1900 it was ordered that the levy for county purposes be 10 1/2 mills; for common school purposes 5 mills; for a city bounty fund 1 mill upon all real and personal property other than upon sheep and upon sheep 1 cent per head.

Ordered that warrants now in the clerk's office to the amount of \$26.35 which were drawn more than seven years ago and have not been called be cancelled by the clerk of this county.

Palmer, publisher of the Crook County Journal, having filed his subscription list and affidavit there-to and no other application having been filed it is ordered that the Crook County Journal be awarded the county printing and be and is declared the official paper of Crook county and that the same rates be and are hereby established and agreed upon as were agreed upon for the year 1900, except for publishing semi-annual statements an additional compensation of 50 per cent be allowed over and above the regular rate.

Ordered that the clerk hereafter draw a warrant in the sum of \$10 in favor of John Loftus each month until further ordered.

The court having examined the books, accounts and receipts of the county clerk found them correct and that the amount of fees collected by him for the six months ending Dec. 31, 1900, amounts to \$555.95.

In the matter of the A. Zell road, the report of viewers being favorable it is ordered that A. Zell pay into the County Treasury the sum of \$16 and proceed to put said road into good condition and submit evidence thereof at the next term of court for further action.

Two hundred and forty scalps of wild animals were presented and destroyed.

Ordered that the county judge settle with the sheriff on the tax rolls in his possession and docket his findings for further action.
