Queen Victoria.

In the death of Queen Victoria the world loses one of the most illustrious sovereigns who ever lived. The queen died at Cowes on the Isle of Wight at 6:30 p. m. January 22. The next day the Prince of Wales was proclaimed king as Edward VII.

Alexandrina Victoria Queen and Empress, was the daughter and only child of Edward, Duke of Kent, fourth son of George IV, and Victoria Mary, Louisa, fourth daughter of Francis, Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Saalfeld, and sister of Leopold, King of Belgium. She was born at Kensington palace May 24, 1819; ascended the throne of Great Britain and Ireland, June 20, 1837, and was proclaimed Queen, June 21, 1837, and was crowned at Westminster June 28, 1838. She was married to Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, February 10, 1840, and proclaimed Empress of India in 1876. Her husband, the Prince Consort, died Dec. 14, 1861.
