A Communication. The following letter will no doubt interest many of the old-timers of this country who remember Mr. Duncan: Albany, Ore., Feb. 15, 1901.

A. C. Palmer, Prineville, Oregon. My Dear Sir and Friend:

Your beautifully illustrated annual number of the Crook County Journal was received a few days since. Please accept my thanks for same. It contains many familiar scenes as well as much information, and does great credit, it seems to me, to the proprietor.

I also notice several familiar faces, while many others now identified with the business of your growing town are strangers to me. I particularly remember the faces of Hon. B. F. Nichols in his little narrow buggy unlike "the bicycle built for two" with his faithful dog Kemo, starting out to round up the festive herd.
