Hon. J. N. Williamson returned home last week for the first time since the legislature adjourned, and since which time he attended and delivered a telling address on the scalp bounty question at the Woolgrower's Association recently held at Pendleton, a subject upon which no one in Oregon is better qualified to speak. In fact, to his thorough understanding and indomitable energy and perseverance may be attributed the present scalp bounty law. And in this connection it may also be stated with perfect faith that the outcome of the senatorial contest in this state was largely due to his efforts and for which he is entitled to and has received well merited praise. Many other matters of legislation received his earnest attention, supplemented by his thorough knowledge of parliamentary usages and the needs of the state, and reviewing his entire course of action, the citizens of his district have just cause to feel proud of him.

IRRIGATION IN OREGON.

Through Mr. Moody's Efforts Eastern Oregon Will Be Viewed for National Irrigation Plant. We learn from a Washington dispatch to the Oregonian that Representative Moody has been putting in a good many hours about the departments since the close of congress, looking after matters of interest to Eastern Oregon. As a result he has secured the consent of Prof. H. H. Newell, hydrographer of the geological survey, to visit Oregon during the coming summer and, by personal examination, determine just what localities of Eastern Oregon offer the best opportunities for developing the department's plan of irrigation. It is Mr. Moody's hope to have Mr. Pinchot, the forester of the department of agriculture, visit Eastern Oregon while Prof. Newell is here, that the two may tour the state together, and both may get the same idea of conditions among the sheepmen. He thinks that by coming in actual contact with the sheepmen and rangers, these matters to officials will appreciate the true conditions better than they can through correspondence, and

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the same time, the stockmen, when they have met and talked with officials, will learn that there is some good in the methods and rules of the departments, and that these officials are men of practical ideas. Mr. Pinchot, at the personal solicitation of Mr. Moody, has consented to make this visit to Eastern Oregon, although his planned tour for the summer did not reach so far west. He assured Mr. Moody that he anticipated no change in the pasturing policy of the department and is adapted on Cascade reserve. He will make no special investigation in this reserve, since that territory has been thoroughly covered in the past, particularly by Mr. Colville, of the agricultural department, who made a full and comprehensive report upon his return to Washington.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Under the new scalp bounty law all scalp hunters must be present by the person who killed the animals to the county clerk of the county in which they are killed. The clerk will issue a county warrant for the sum of \$2 for each scalp presented. There are no fees to be paid the clerk so that the person gets the full benefit of the bounty. Scalps taken prior to Feb. 28, 1901, will not be accepted. The clerk may require corroborative evidence as to when and where the animals were killed. These are the main facts taken from the new law and parties will save themselves trouble by remembering them.
