END OF LITIGATION.

Columbia Southern Troubles Settled Out of Court.

All the legal troubles of the Columbia Southern railroad have been settled and the litigation in the State Circuit Court and the United States Court will be dismissed. Negotiations which had been pending for several days between E. E. Lytle and Drake C. O'Reilly, the litigants and principle owners of the stock, were brought to a satisfactory conclusion Saturday morning. Mr. O'Reilly will receive for the 1147 shares of stock which he owned and another matter at issue will be submitted to arbitration. It is probable that the old slate will be wiped out to-morrow. E. E. Lytle, of Portland, and W. H. Moore, the Moro banker, become owners of the entire issue of stock of the road.

As soon as the Columbia Southern is clear of courts the management will consider plans for the extension of the road southward from Shaniko, the present terminus, to Prineville, and perhaps farther, and eastward through the John Day valley to Ontario, on the Oregon Short Line. Every foot of the territory through which it is proposed to extend the road is as good as that tapped by the present line from Biggs to Shaniko. When this road was first projected from Biggs to Moro, the seat of Sherman county, there were few who shared the confident prediction of Lytle and O'Reilly, the promoters, that it would be profitable. The road opened up a region, the resources and possibilities of which were little known. The line paid beyond the expectations, even of those who built it, and the Shaniko extension has been equally successful. Crook county of which Prineville is the seat, lying south of Sherman county, is rapidly settling up. For it the era of large stock ranches is passing and the period of small farms is opening. At its present rate of development it will not be long before it will be able to furnish a large traffic for a railroad.

Lying to the eastward of Shaniko is the John Day valley, one of the most promising of the isolated regions of Oregon. If it had a railroad it would rival the Willamette valley for the production of grain, fruit, butter and cheese. It is now without transportation facilities, though the Sumpter valley line is heading into it from Sumpter. In the absence of transportation facilities, the people have no inducement to grow grain and fruit for shipment, and stockraising and mining have been the
