The Settlers Win.

A decision has just been handed down by the Commissioner of the General Land Office which affected a large area of our neighboring county of Lake. It reverses all decisions heretofore made in the Warner valley land cases which have been adverse to the settlers on the so-called swamp land.

It is to be hoped that the Secretary of the Interior will sustain this decision and that the lands will be awarded to the settlers, as they have earned them, and besides, the swamp land act was a gigantic swindle at its best.

Chattel Mortgages Must Be Recorded. Chattel mortgages are governed by a new law, passed by the recent session of the legislature. Not only are the fees different from those imposed heretofore, but the manner of keeping record of them also is different.
