Relation of Bryan's.

The attorney for James G. Green, convicted in Skamania county of the murder of E. Benjamin, and now in jail awaiting action on a motion for a new trial, has received a letter from Charles G. Hodges, Justice of the Peace at Sands, N. C. Green's former home, containing interesting news concerning the condemned man, Hodges, who is Green's kinsman, says Green is a cousin of William Jennings Bryan, and comes of good family. He also says any number of affidavits can be obtained from Green's former friends to the effect that Green, when under the influence of liquor was crazy and not responsible for his acts. Green's friends purpose to do everything possible towards obtaining a new trial for him.

Prof. McElroy Dead.

Prof. E. B. McElroy died at his home in Eugene, Oregon, May 4. Ebenezer Burton McElroy, A. M. Ph. D., was a native of Pennsylvania, where he was born September 17, 1842, being the youngest of a family of twelve children. His early life was spent on a farm. After completing his education, which he acquired in his native state, he began teaching, at which he was engaged in 1861, when the war broke out. His patriotic spirit took possession of him, and he enlisted as a private in Company B, First West Virginia Volunteers. He served in that regiment until 1863, when he was mustered out and re-enlisted in the One Hundredth Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry, and served until July, 1865 when he was again mustered out. Professor McElroy was married in 1869, to Miss Agnes McFadden. Together they came to Oregon in 1874, and settled in Corvallis, where he taught one year in the public schools, and the following year was given the chair of literature in the State Agricultural College, which he filled until he was elected state superintendent of public instruction in 1880, in which office he served three terms.

Militia Encampment.

Adjutant General C. U. Gantenbein was in Salem last week to consult with Governor T. T. Geer regarding military matters. He stated that the Military Board had completed the new regulations, and they were now in the hands of the State Printer. It is a revision of the old National Guard regulations, arranged so as to conform to the new Military Code. At the special meeting of the Board held on Thursday, it was decided to recommend to the Governor that the National Guard be placed in an encampment on or field duty this summer, for such number of days as the military fund would allow, and it was thought advisable to give the Third

Regiment (of Portland) a practice march, while the Fourth Regiment with headquarters at Eugene, and First Separate Battalion, at La Grande, separate camps, while the two troops of cavalry—Sumpter and Lebanon—be ordered out on practice marches; the same was recommended for the light battery in Portland.

Last week the Governor fixed the places of encampment for the Fourth Regiment at Eugene, and for the First Separate Battalion at La Grande. These places were selected because of their location. Eugene has two companies of the Fourth, with three to the north and three to the south, thus making economical to hold the encampment there. La Grande has one company, with one on each side of it.

He Planted Gold.

The Sodaville correspondent of the Lebanon Express-Advance says: A farmer living near here, because of some extensive experience with local banks in the past, decided he would be his own banker. A few months ago he made a deposit of a few twenties in his bank—a sack of his recent crop. Several months thereafter a neighbor went to our farmer banker to buy a sack of seed to finish his spring sowing. By mistake the banker sold him the sack that contained the twenties. The sack was taken home and the farmer who bought it, after a few day's delay, proceeded to sow its contents on his field. He went striding across the field, casting generous handfuls right and left, thinking of the golden harvest that ere long would reward his toil, when he suddenly stopped short and struck an attitude as he jerked his hand out of the sack with what he at first thought was a dead rat entangled among his fingers, but which he quickly saw an old cotton glove—his neighbor's bank and deposit. Wool Rate.

The following wool rates for the present season, taking effect at once have been established: Wool compressed in bales, carloads, minimum weight 24,000, from Shaniko to New York, Chicago, Boston, Hartford, Philadelphia, Baltimore, and points there-with, \$1.40, per 100, pounds. Wool in sacks, or bales, any quantity, from Shaniko to The Dalles, 30, cents per 100 pounds. Wool in sacks, any quantity, from all stations on the Columbia Southern Railway to Shaniko 5 cents per 100 pounds.
