Oregon Children's Home.

An agent of The Oregon Children's Home Society has been visiting Prineville in the interests of abused, neglected and orphaned children. This is a state organization, incorporated, and auxiliary to the National Association. Because of the superior benefits to the children which this plan of home finding affords, the Columbian Exposition awarded medal & diploma. For many years the name of President McKinley has stood as president of the Ohio branch, and he is now a liberal supporter of the work. Lyman J. Gage was for ten years vice president of the National headquarters at Chicago. In the older states several permanent receiving homes have been the gifts of wealthy persons. Who will provide a temporary home for Oregon children? Several fine boys are now waiting for homes to open to them. The average cost of each child to the society is fifty dollars. This is the cheapest method ever devised for caring for the homeless. And is better for the child than being placed together in institutions, where good and bad mingle together, and where contagious diseases have a wide spread and fatal effect. After a few months of good care the wards of the society compare favorably with other children in the community. The society keeps a careful supervision over these children until of legal age. The work is supported entirely by membership dues, and contributions. \$100 constitutes one a benefactor, \$50 a patron, \$25 a life member, \$5 an annual active member, \$1 an annual social member. There are many people of means living in the country whom the agents of the society never meet. If any such would help by donation or by subscribing as a member, they can do so either through the hands of Local Board, or by sending to the society direct. The Local Board consists of the following members; Rev. B. F. Harper, Mr. Robt. Smith, Mrs. S. J. Newsom, and Mrs. D. F. Stewart. The Dist. Help a child to find a home. By so doing you lessen the tax required for reformatories, and save the children from becoming ignorant and vicious. Money thus invested returns a large interest by the addition of noble men and women to the commonwealth. May some of the wealth of the land overflow in this channel. Climate And Crop Bulletin.

Boyd, Wasco county, J. W. B. Haveley.—Fine rain Monday night; best rain for several years. Plenty of wind; somewhat cool Saturday cloudy and warm. Some slight damage to heavy grain—by wind. Weston, Umatilla county, Maud M. Baker.—Wheat makes good growth, but considerable harm from the late frosts is reported. The 0.80. of an inch of rainfall greatly benefited vegetables, especially cabbages and potatoes. Prunes, early pears and cherries promise large crops; cherries will soon ripen. Strawberries are not doing as well as usual, owing to frost and rain.

Douglas, Morrow county, J. A. Troedson.—Heavy rain fell Tuesday and Wednesday; Thursday morning very windy. Fall grain is looking fine; spring grain is heading.

Richland, Baker county, G. S. Binheimer.—The weather has been cold and blustery, with some cold

rains and frost; considerable fruit was killed and most all gardens. Some are replanting and others think it is too late. Haying will commence in two weeks, with fair prospects.

Keno, Klamath county, B. E. Kerns.—The past week has been almost to cold for crops of all kinds. Heavy frosts have damaged the first cutting of alfalfa considerably. A copious rain, with warm weather, would be of great benefit just now. Fruit has been damaged but very little by frosts.

The production of copper in 1900 is estimated at about 470,866 tons, of which North America yielded 278,787 tons, England 520 tons, Austria-Hungary 1130 tons, Russia 6000 tons, Chile 25,700 tons, Germany 31,950 tons and Japan 27,500 tons—the remainder coming mainly from Australia, Tasmania and Spain. The relative importance of the various use of this metal may probably be assumed to be fairly well shown by the experience of Germany in 1900, as reported by Consul General Mason: Of a total consumption of 106,696 tons about 40,000 tons were used in making electrical conductors and machinery; 20,000 tons were rolled into sheets and rods; 35,000 tons were made into brass and bronze; 3000 tons were used in chemical manufactures; 20,000 tons in ship construction, boiler tubes, etc., and the remainder was made into coins, castings, bronze powder, builders' hardware, gas and electric lighting fixtures and various alloys with other metals.

Not Fitted For Anything.

The trouble with a good many young men is that they are not fitted for anything. They want to spend the first thirty years of their life being funny, then drop into a good position with a fat salary. Because old business men will not put them at once into these positions they settle down to dry goods box growlers, criticising the government and condemning the rich. 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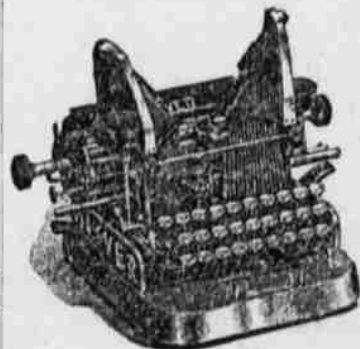
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
