Look and Key to Sacred City.

According to a Washington dispatch, the National museum, at that city, will soon place on exhibition the lock and key to the front gate of the Sacred City in Pekin. The gate is immediately in front of the imperial residence. The Chinese inscription on the lock will be translated. The lock is an iron cylinder, three feet and 10 inches long. Extending from the cylinder is an iron rod, bent back that it might pass through the gate hasp and into the lock guide. In the lock are four tumblers. The key is of iron and is about four feet long. The lock and key were sent through Minister Conger as a gift to the National museum by the Rev. W. T. Hobart, a Methodist missionary in China.
