Lowell, for U. S. Senator and J. N. Williamson for secretary of state, and we could stand the weakened hobbles for awhile longer; although Salem is getting to be a power for it reaches out and includes Turner, the Reform school, the Mute school and Chemawa, and we don't want her to absorb our coyote country.
