DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, General Land Office, Washington, D. C., July 15, 1901. Notice is hereby given of the following Executive Order, restoring certain tracts in the Cascade Range Forest Reserve, Oregon, to the public domain: "Executive Mansion, June 29, 1901. In accordance with the provisions of the Act of Congress approved June 4, 1897, (30 Stat., 34-36) and by virtue of the authority thereby given, and on recommendation of the Secretary of the Interior, it is hereby ordered that Township twenty two (22) South, Range nine (9) East, and Township twenty three (23) South, Range nine (9) East, Willamette Meriden, Oregon, within the limits of the Cascade Range Forest Reserve, be restored to the public domain after sixty days notice hereof, by publication as required by law, these tracts having been found better adapted to agricultural than forest purposes. WILLIAM McKINLEY." The above described lands will be restored to the public domain September 30, 1901, then becoming subject to settlement and entry at the United States Land office, Lakeview, Oregon.
