**County Court Proceedings.**

The County Court met Wednesday Nov. 6, there being present judge W. C. Wills and commissioners Templeton and Healey. The following proceedings were had:

In the matter of the sale of old lumber from the Trout creek bridge; the bid of J. H. Garrett was accepted. Garrett charged on bill for work done \$7.

In the matter of petition of Grater, Benton & Co for liquor license. Matter considered and license granted for six months from November 8, 1901.

In the matter of petition of N. A. Newbill for change of county road. Continued for correction.

In the matter of confirmation of tax sales for 1900. Sheriff returns filed with clerk and sales confirmed.

In the matter of counting the scalps of wild animals. Nov. 9 scalps counted, affidavits examined and compared with warrants and found correct.

In the matter of petition of F. Forest, et al. Report of viewers and survey showing irregularities and the court being fully convinced as to the illegality of the proceedings and record; the prayer of petitioners is refused.

In the matter of the assignment of tax certificates No 124, dated August 19, 1897, and No 167, dated Nov 18 1898. Ordered that said certificates be assigned to A. C. Palmer for and in consideration of the sum of \$13.70, being taxes, costs and penalty.

In the matter of bill for the construction of bridge across Crooked river at Yanceys. Ordered that the clerk draw warrant against road fund in the sum of \$1332.33, being 2/3 of the price contracted for material furnished and the construction thereof according to plans and specification on file.

In the matter of the compensation for injuries and damages of James Fuller. Ordered that the clerk draw a warrant in favor of James Fuller for the sum of \$65, being a sum accepted in full compensation for all injuries and damages of every description received by reason of an accident with pile-driver while building the Trout creek bridge in Crook county Oregon, during the year 1901; and being in full satisfaction of any claim he might have against Crook county for such accident, including the right of action for damages.

In the matter of new warrants for tax rolls for the years 1896, 1897, 1898, 1899 and 1900. Ordered that warrants attach returnable in 60 days from the 11 of November 1901.

In the matter of the purchase of site for the landing of the Trout creek bridge. Ordered that the clerk draw a warrant in favor of E. G. Bolter for the sum of \$50 in consideration of his dedicating a certain piece of land to Crook county for road purposes; said land being at the southern end of the bridge known as the Trout creek bridge in said county.

Ordered that the clerk notify the road supervisors in districts 15 and 4 to proceed to call out all labor yet due in their districts and proceed to put their roads in good repair.

**Treatment for Scab.**

True scab is a familiar disease to sheep raisers in every part of the world. The most prominent symptom is an itchiness of the skin compelling the sheep to rub, scratch or bite itself whenever possible. It will scratch and kick itself with its hind feet, thus destroying the wool wherever the feet can reach. It will also bite itself, and will become extremely restless, more particularly at night, preventing the animal from resting and making it nervous and irritable.

The treatment of scab is a very simple matter, if taken in the start before there is much irritation of skin. The parasite does not penetrate the skin, like those producing mange in the horse and dog. The parasites producing scab in sheep live on the surface, like lice, so most any of the ordinary dips applied to them will come in contact with the parasites and kill them, but may not kill the eggs, which will hatch out in from ten days to two weeks, when the application must be repeated. If the disease has been allowed to become chronic, then there will be scabs formed so that enough parasites will get under and not come in contact with the medicine, and they will still live to perpetuate their kind.

In order to treat scab successfully the wool should all be clipped off, so as to expose the skin as much as possible to the air. Like mange in the horse, the diseased animal should be separated from the well and should be well fed, to build up the physical strength as quickly as possible, as it is a well known fact that parasitic life lives at the expense of physical life. Build up the physical strength, and the body offers greater resistance to parasitic life. After the animals have been dipped they should not be turned into pasture where they were while suffering from the disease. The parasite is not long lived, consequently animals kept out of an infected pasture for a couple of months can then be safely turned in again.
