### Take Land Under Cary Act.

The Carey act which is coming into some prominence now in Eastern Oregon will be the means for the reclamation of a large quantity of our arid lands, says the Pendleton Tribune. In Umatilla county the law may be applied soon in one or two localities and also in Baker county. Opportunities are offered and the delay in taking advantage of the act is claimed to be due largely to lack of knowledge of its provisions.

A large acreage of sagebrush

land has been located in Harney county during the last month as desert land, under the Carey act. The Harney Valley improvement company has located 60,000 acres southeast of Harney City. The company expects to take a large ditch out of the Silvies river above Burns. A company organized by Portland capitalists has located a large tract near the same locality and expects to get water by means of deep artesian wells and from small mountain streams. The Wright's Point Improvement com-

pany has located six sections south of Burns and will locate more land soon. This makes three companies that have organized in the last year for reclaiming Harney's large acreage of desert land. They have located over 100,000 acres. Besides, a large number of settlers and stockmen have located claims. The interest that has been created and the publicity given may result in other efforts to secure good public land.

The Carey act was approved August 18, 1894, and remains a law until August 18, 1904, its time limit having been placed at the end of 10 years. The act provides for the reclamation of arid lands in Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, North Dakota and Utah, granting to each state all lands not to exceed 1,000,000 acres that it may reclaim. The state may appropriate funds for this purpose if it chooses, and realize the cost of surveys, ditch building, boring, building reservoirs, from the sale of lands. This might not be possible in all cases. In Oregon the legislature passed an act transferring the right granted to the state by congress to private parties. Any person or company may reclaim arid lands according to the provisions of the national act.

### Oregon's Game Birds.

The Mongolian pheasant (*Phasianus torquatus*) which has become so thoroughly at home in this state since its introduction by the late Judge O. N. Denny that its name in this country is inseparably linked with that of Oregon, is filling an advertising mission that the general public probably knows little about, says the Telegram.

The demand for this far-famed game bird is growing—so much so that breeders are scarcely able to keep up the supply. Orders for Mongolian pheasants come from almost every state and territory in the Union. All these orders must come to Oregon, the new Western home of the bird and the only state in which it is raised to any extent for breeding purposes.

The record of live bird shipments during the year just closed of Game and Forestry Warden Quimby tells a remarkable story. Birds were shipped to 22 states and territories during the year and the number reached 548. Of this number 445 were Mongolian pheasants; 92 quail, and one a silver pheasant. These birds brought the breeders about \$1500, but the financial showing is not to be compared with the advertising the birds have done for Oregon.

### Pullman Ordinary Sleepers.

The tourist travel between the east and the Pacific coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleeper, being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making coffee and tea and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the comforts and wants of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car is attached to the "Chicago-Portland Special," which goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger. Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service being nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
