Three road masters will be appointed at the adjourned meeting of the county court in February. The county has been divided into three districts and a road master will be appointed for each district. Good men will be selected and the court will consider the application of those who want a job. There will be but three months work and good wages will be paid for the time actually employed. The work on the roads should all be done inside of three months, as the spring is the time for such work to be done to be effective. The law contemplates the appointment of one road master to serve nine months, but in a county as large as this one man cannot do the work at the proper time and to get it done in time is the proper thing, so the court has changed the form somewhat and will appoint three to serve three months actual work, and the remainder of the time the roads will be in the hands of the road supervisors of the various districts.

It is reported on good authority that there is several cases of "Malaria itch" in the county. This is simply a new name for an old acquaintance, and is nothing more or less than smallpox. It matters not by what name it is known, it is contagious and should be quarantined and stamped out before it gains sufficient headway to destroy business and close the schools of the county and turn away trade and immigration that is badly needed. The writer has had two years experience with this same itch and knows that it is as bad or worse than the "itch for office" that afflicts a great many persons in Oregon biennially. The county board of health should meet and take steps to stamp out the disease in the country districts and the city will take care of such cases as come within its corporate limits. The disease is not necessarily fatal and may be stamped out in a short time by enforcing a strict quarantine.

Registering is now on at the court house. All voters must register in order to vote at the next election without having to swear their vote in by six householders.

In the matter of the correction of the roll of 1900: It appearing to the court that there is a mistake on the roll of 1900 in placing the property in district 24 instead of district 25. It further appears that the amount of school tax due said district amounts to \$19.25, it is ordered that the sheriff charge said amount of school tax to the roll of 1900 and proceed to collect the same. It is further ordered that the clerk of

this court charge the sheriff with said sum on the summary of the 1900 roll.

In the matter of fixing boundaries of road districts: Ordered that the boundaries of all road districts conform to those of the voting precincts, and the number of the road districts correspond with that of the voting precincts.

In the matter of the appointment of supervisor for Howard road district: Ordered that Jasper Wright be appointed until his successor is elected and qualified.

Same, Kutcher road district No. 23. Ed Kutcher appointed until his successor is elected and qualified.

Same, Breese road district No. 24. Richard Breese appointed until his successor is elected and qualified.

In the matter of supervisors reports: G. H. Osborn district No. 6. Ordered that supervisor pay himself \$1.75 out of cash on hands amounting to \$6.75. Ordered that clerk furnish labor book from 65 to 200 inclusive, and cash book from 154 to 200 inclusive and charge the same.

W. H. Staats, No. 3: Ordered that supervisor pay himself balance of cash on hands amounting to \$15.75 and that the clerk draw warrant in his favor for \$8.25.

L. Connell, No. 16: Clerk ordered to draw warrant in favor of supervisor for \$10. Ordered to be credited with 101 and 102. Ordered that receipts 50 be returned and labor receipts from 103 to 150 inclusive be returned and charged in book.

C. Montgomery, No. 9: Clerk ordered to draw warrant in his favor for \$50.50, his bill being \$53.87 less cash collected \$3.37.

E. A. Parker, No. 18. Clerk ordered to draw warrant in his favor for \$45.50 and to return him cash receipts from 410 to 450 and labor receipts 429 and 450 and charge him with same.

In the matter of illegal tax sale of land to H. T. Hill: The land sold being unpatented the sale is illegal and clerk ordered to draw warrant in his favor for \$8.28, the amount paid.

In the matter of appointment of road supervisor in Johnson creek district No. 13. Green Beard appointed until his successor is elected and qualified.

In the matter of the reports of road supervisors: S. J. Clemons, No. 20. Supervisor ordered to pay himself \$29.37 cash in hand, and clerk ordered to draw warrant in his favor for \$2.63, and ordered to return labor receipt books with receipts from 357 to 400 inclusive; also cash receipt book 356 to 400 inclusive and charge the same.

R. W. Breese, No. 24. Warrant ordered drawn in his favor for \$16. Clerk ordered to return labor receipts from 207 to 250 and cash receipts from 203 to 250 inclusive, and charge the same.

James Black. Report approved and warrant ordered drawn in his favor for \$90. Clerk ordered to notify him to file bond as required by law.

J. H. Gray, No. 22. Ordered that supervisor pay himself \$5.62 cash on hand, and clerk ordered to draw warrant for \$18.38. Cash receipts ordered returned and recharged, and labor receipts from 14 to 150 inclusive returned and charged.

In the matter of correcting the roll of J. H. Kelly: It appearing to the court that there was an error in the assessment of said J. H. Kelly and that his property should have been in school district 25 instead of 24, it being subject to special school tax of 5 mills, which amounts to \$2.05. It is ordered that the sheriff place said tax on the roll of 1900 and proceed to collect the same, and the clerk ordered to charge said \$2.05 upon the roll of 1900.

In the matter of the balance due Ed Harbin on the Newsom creek bridge: Clerk ordered to draw a warrant on road fund for \$87.07, and a warrant on the general fund for \$285.26, and one warrant on same fund for \$300.

In the matter of supervisors report of Joe Street: Warrant ordered drawn for \$60.50, and clerk ordered to furnish delinquent list. Supervisor ordered to collect the same by demand, and if not paid then to certify the same to the sheriff for collection.
