Conditions in the Philippines.

Judge W. H. Taft, governor general of the Philippines, who reached San Francisco last week on his return to the United States on a leave of absence, in the course of an interview, gave out the following information of the favorable conditions now prevailing in the islands:

"I wish the press would correct the impression that there is war in all the islands. The insurrection is confined to two localities—the province of Batangas and the is-

land of Samar. This morning I received a most encouraging telegram from General Wright, who is acting governor in my absence. It said that owing to General Bell's strong repressive measures the trouble in Batangas is being quieted. He further said that 700 rifles had been surrendered, and as there are only 1100 or 1200 rifles in the province, there is no doubt that Batangas will be as peaceful as any of the other provinces.

"I don't think that General Bell will have to adopt the reconcentra-

do principle to Batangas. I don't see that there will be any necessity for this, as this dispatch plainly indicates that the province is in a fair way to pacification.

"The dispatch then says that there are 843 teachers in the islands in 450 places, and 200 of these places are unoccupied by United States troops. I may say that the Filipino is not hostile to the teacher. One was captured some time ago, but he was sent home in a hammock. The inference is plain that they entertain no hostility to the pedagogues or to pedagogy.

"Now, I wish to impress upon everybody that civil government is a success. There is a strong peace party in the islands, and it is composed of the most influential men among the Filipinos. They are working earnestly and zealously toward bringing about happy relations between their countrymen and the government. They are using all that is in their power to bring in the recalcitrant leaders. I have never been so encouraged as to the prospects of the Philippines as I have within the past three months. There has certainly been a great change in the sentiment of the people. They are beginning to appreciate the fact that civil government means better times for them.

"If you had seen the farewell receptions that were given me by the people on my leaving the islands you would have realized that there was sincerity in the expression of the wish for civil government to continue. Before I left I received reports from the governors of the different provinces, and the tone of each report was most encouraging. I am encouraged and shall so report to Washington. There are 35 provinces capable of government."

It was his home in life; his children are buried there, and it was his wish to lie beside them. More than this, it is the desire of Mrs. McKinley and his family as well as his nearest and dearest friends, that the Nation's tribute should be builded there.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers.

The tourist travel between the east and the Pacific coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleeper, being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making coffee and tea and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the comforts and wants of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car is attached to the "Chicago Portland Special," which goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Granger. Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service being nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.

Warning to Mail Contractors.

Whoever may be the lucky, (or unlucky) men to be awarded the star route mail contracts leading into Lakeview, and to go into effect next July must look to the public interests as well as their own, otherwise there will be serious trouble ahead for them.
