Will Adopt Mays Law.

From present indications the Republicans will avoid naming their choice for United States Senator at their state convention says the Telegram. There are so many aspirants for that position that the selection of any particular individual would very probably cause those neglected to fight the Republican ticket in their respective districts. Under the circumstances leading Republicans believe the best policy to pursue is to say nothing about the United States

Senatorship at the convention, and leave the fight for the next Legislature to settle, as was the custom in the past.

As for the Democrats, the situation is somewhat different, and the party will be the first to place the Mays' law to practical use.

The law fathered by State Senator Franklin Pierce Mays, at the last session of the Legislature, provided that parties nominate a candidate for United States Senator at the time the nominees for state offices are made. United States

Senator cannot be elected by popular vote, under the constitution as now framed, but through the agency of the Mays law the people of Oregon are enabled to express their preference for the post, providing the parties make the necessary nominations. When votes are cast for candidates for state offices the elector can declare his choice for United States Senator. At the session of the Legislature, when the time arrives for electing a Senator, the members of the Legislature will have read to them the names of those candidates for Senator voted for at the preceding general election, and the number of votes each received. The theory of this is that the members of the Legislature if they wish to abide by the wishes of their constituents, will vote for the candidate receiving the highest number of votes at the election.

Having advocated for years the election of members of the United States Senate by popular vote, the Democrats cannot well afford to pass by the Mays bill, since it is the opening wedge toward the desired end. Acknowledging this fact the Democratic State Central Committee has determined to make a place for the nomination of a United States Senator on the programme of its state convention.

Of course, the number of Democrats believing that their candidate for the Upper House at Washington will receive the greatest amount of votes is small. Scarcely any of them are as sanguine as all that. Nevertheless, the seekers after the nomination and those whose names are mentioned embrace prominent men in the state.

Pullman Ordinary Sleepers.

The tourist travel between the east and the Pacific coast has reached enormous proportions in the last few years, and calls for a special class of equipment. To meet this demand the Pullman Co. has issued from its shops what it technically calls the "Pullman Ordinary Sleeper." These cars appear similar to the regular sleeper, being built on the same plan, but not furnished with the same elegance. They are equipped with mattresses, blankets, sheets, pillows, pillow-cases, towels, combs, brushes, etc., requiring nothing of the kind to be furnished by the passenger. Each car has a stove for making coffee and tea and doing "light housekeeping," and each section can be fitted with an adjustable table. A uniformed porter accompanies each car, his business being to make up berths, keep the car clean, and look after the comforts and wants of the passengers. In each of the trains which are dispatched daily from Portland by the O. R. & N. Co. is to be found one of these "Pullman Ordinary Sleepers." The car is attached to the "Chicago Portland Special," which goes through to Chicago without change, and the one in the "Atlantic Express" runs to Kansas City without change. Passengers in this car for Chicago change to a similar car at Grand. Much of the first class travel is being carried in these cars, the rates being lower, and the service being nearly equal to that in the palace sleepers.
