What His Duties Are.

The appointment by the County courts of road masters is under authority of a law passed by the last legislature.

The law provides for the annual levy of a tax of not more than 10 mills to be used in building and improving roads, and the said tax shall be paid in money, and collected as are other taxes. In January of each year the county court shall appoint a road master whose term of service shall be one year or until his successor is appointed and qualified, and his compensation shall be enough to justify him to devote his whole time to bridges and roads from March 1st to December 1st of each year. The roadmaster must make oath and give bond of \$2000, for faithful performance of duty and at any time may be removed. He shall have power to determine how and in what manner road supervisors shall expend the money apportioned to their districts and his orders and instructions shall be implicitly obeyed by said supervisors. He must make recommendations to the court for construction, repair and improvements of roads and bridges investigate petitions for such improvements and report his findings in writing to the county court. He has charge of all tools, and the county court shall not make payments for any contracts until the roadmaster has approved the same. It is contemplated that he shall have ample knowledge concerning road construction and be competent to prepare or pass upon plans and specifications as well as the construction or repair of bridges.

When 12 freeholders of any district petition for an extensive improvement, requiring change of grade, the supervisor may be called in to make surveys, after which the roadmaster and county court may let contracts or hire men to make the improvement, if so desired.

The taxes levied under the new law are to be in lieu of the road taxes heretofore levied by county courts.—Ex.

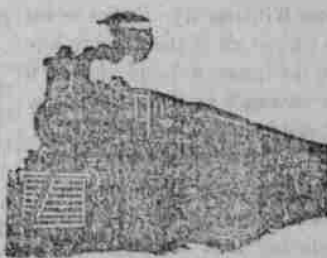
