

How is This?

Hon. George Miller, of Arlington, who represented Grant, Gilliam, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler Counties in the last session of the State Legislature is confident that Congressman Moody will be his own successor.

This will, we think, be news to quite a good many people in this County. If Mr. Moody secures the delegation from this County it will be the first time that sort of thing has happened.

Against Mr. Moody, personally, we have nothing to say, but it is apparent to all that he lacks the necessary qualifications for a Congressman; that during the time he has been in the house he has accomplished, practically, nothing.

As a business proposition Eastern Oregon demands a vigorous, aggressive and able worker in the house of representatives; a man whose management of his own affairs gives some assurance that he will be able to successfully manage the public affairs that are referred to him for consideration.

If Mr. Williamson cannot be nominated there are other, brainy, able and efficient men who would, if elected, represent the State with ability and success.

We think Mr. Moody and his friends will learn, a little later on, that Gilliam County is not to be controlled by any would be politi-

cal boss. The people will object to having matters of this kind arranged for them, and will be prepared to take care of their own interests, in their own way.—Arlington Record.

The Bill is Pending.

A bill for the establishment of schools of mines in the various states, is pending in congress. The first year it gives \$10,000, and increases \$1,000 each year thereafter until the sum reaches \$20,000 per annum for the maintenance of such schools of mines.

The bill passed the senate last session, but died on the house calendar. It has, however, been introduced in the house, by Grosvenor of Ohio, and is now in the hands of the committee on mines and mining.

A strong contest has been waged between the agricultural colleges and the state universities in the various states over the bill, each striving to secure the appropriation. As introduced by Grosvenor it provided that the appropriation should go to the colleges.

Late news from Washington however, is to the effect that the universities and colleges have agreed upon a compromise, and that the appropriation is to be divided equally among them.

The bill will yet have to pass both houses and senate. If it goes through as agreed upon, both O. A. C. and the state university will at first receive \$5,000 and ultimately \$10,000 a year for schools of mines.—Corvallis Times.
