TETHEROW-In Portland on Feb. 19, 1902, Mrs. Sophronia J. Tetherow, aged 67 years.

Sophronia Jamison was born Feb 12, 1834, in Pike county, Missouri Was married and with her husband crossed the plains in 1852. Before C. M. Cartwright paid the ranch reaching Oregon ber husband and an extended visit. He leaves for child died of cholem. About 1854 she was again married to Andrew J Tetherow, of Polk county, Oregon. In 1872 they came to this county. In the family there were five children, two of which, with the father have died, the latter three years ago. Two sons and one daughter survive her. She was a great sufferer, yet not complaining. About a year ago she went lief through a surgical operation. She expressed her doubts as to its being successful, and expressed her readiness to depart this life. In early life she became a christian and united with the M. E. church, of which she was a member at her death. She died in Portland on Feb. 19, 1902, seven days after ber 68th birthday, and was interred in the cemetery near this city on Feb. 24. The funeral was conducted by the pastor of the M. E. church.
