From the Prospector.

Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Bell, of Prineville, visited in Ashwood several days last week, and were the guests of Jim Wood. Mrs. Wood and Mrs. Bell were schoolmates in Prineville.

The Ashwood Gold and Silver Mining Co., known as the Disappointment Company, have an open cut of 64 feet on the west side of Ash Butte, and their tunnel started about four feet. They are drifting in on the vein and are showing up some good quartz.

A. W. White, who has struck a ledge on Whetstone Gulch, was in town this week exhibiting a piece of quartz that shows native silver. His claim lies about three miles above town, and the report of the rich strike he has made has occasioned no little excitement.

Mr. O. M. Rosendale, a mining expert from Portland, will arrive in camp this week for the purpose of examining the White Butte Mining Co.'s property. The company has a prospective buyer and should Mr. Rosendale approve the property the deal will in all probability be closed.

Interest in Ashwood, last week, all centered in the legal combat in Judge Childers' court, over the case of Derham against Lawler. Mr. Derham was represented by W. A. Bell, of Prineville; and E. C. Goodwin, of Antelope, and Geo. Barnes, of Prineville, represented the defendant. The citizens of the camp were out in their full voting strength, and Judge Childers, entrenched behind stacks of musty law books and dangerous looking legal documents, looked the embodiment of Justice. A large number of witnesses were examined on the question of the ownership of the property involved, after which counsel argued the various points brought out in the testimony. Judge Childers rendered a decision in favor of the plaintiff.

DIED.

TETHEROW—In Portland on Feb. 19, 1902, Mrs. Sophronia J. Tetherow, aged 67 years.

Sophronia Jamison was born Feb. 12, 1834, in Pike county, Missouri. Was married and with her husband crossed the plains in 1852. Before reaching Oregon her husband and child died of cholera. About 1854 she was again married to Andrew J. Tetherow, of Polk county, Oregon. In 1872 they came to this county. In the family there were five children, two of which, with the father have died, the latter three years ago. Two sons and one daughter survive her. She was a great sufferer, yet not complaining. About a year ago she went to Portland. Recently she sought relief through a surgical operation. She expressed her doubts as to its being successful, and expressed her readiness to depart this life. In early life she became a christian and united with the M. E. church, of which she was a member at her death. She died in Portland on Feb. 19, 1902, seven days after her 68th birthday, and was interred in the cemetery near this city on Feb. 24. The funeral was conducted by the pastor of the M. E. church.
