Call for the Republican Primaries and County Convention.

The Republican County Convention for Crook county is hereby called to meet in Prineville, at the court house, on March 24th, 1902, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating officers for the coming state election, and also to elect delegates to the state and congressional conventions, and to do such other business as may be brought before the convention.

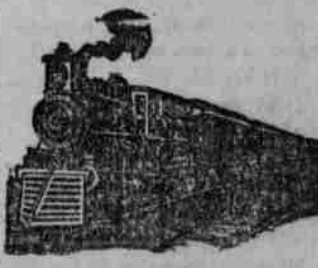
