Mazamas' Annual Outing.

Conforming with the wishes of the majority, the ninth annual outing of the Mazamas will be made to Mount Adams, Washington. Leaving Portland for White Salmon on the morning of July 15th, 1902, the following day to Trout Lake where permanent quarters will be established during the stay, which will be from the 15th to the 26th of July, inclusive. Trout Lake, aside from being remarkably beautiful and enchanting is one of the most ideal and attractive campgrounds in the Cascade Range. A spot full of "dreamy splendor" where the atmosphere is redolent with the perfume of wild flowers. The clearest water, the gamest trout, the most colossal sculpturing in nature, may be seen from its shores; while in the immediate vicinity are many lava and ice caves, distinctive and unique on themselves, and to which side trips will be made during encampment.

It was the original intention of the Mazamas to join the Sierra Club of San Francisco, in its outing to Mount Shasta, and other points in June next, and we regret conditions will not permit us to do so in a body, but recommend all Mazamas who can to participate in the generously accorded invitation to attend the annual outing of our neighbor organization.

Mount Adams is one of the giants of our Cordilleran region, rising 12,400 feet above the Pacific Ocean. A diadem of snow, diverging and transforming into crevasses and glacial cascade. The customary camping lecture and mountain-lore will be rigidly observed as a part of the outing program. We expect to have with us many Scientists from abroad and elsewhere. The expenses of the trip to be nominal. An itinerary will be issued later.
