Nature's Ice House.

The number of birds that go to the arctic regions to breed is vast beyond conception. They go not by thousands, but by tens and hundreds of thousands, and because nowhere else in the world does nature place such a lavish of prodigality of food.

The vegetarian consists of cranberry, cloudberry, and crowberry bushes, and these, forced by the perpetual sunshine of the arctic Summer, bear enormous crops of fruit. But the crop is not ripe until the middle and end of the arctic Summer, and if the fruit-eating birds had to wait until it was ripe they would starve in the meantime, as they arrive on the very day of the melting of the snow.

But each year the snow descends on an immense crop of ripe fruit before the birds have time to gather it. It is thus preserved perfectly fresh and pure, and the melting of the snow discloses the bushes, with the unconsumed last year's crop hanging on them or lying ready to be eaten, on the ground.

The frozen meal stretches across the breadth of Northern Asia. It never decays, and it is accessible the moment the snow melts. The same heat which thaws the fruit brings into being the most prolific insect life in the world—the mosquito swarms on the tundra. No European can live there without a veil after the snow melts. The gun barrels are black with them, and clouds of them often obscure the sight.

Thus the insect-eating birds have only to open their mouths to fill them with mosquitoes and thus the presence of swarms of cliff chaffs, pipis, and the wagtails in this arctic region is accounted for.—Cincinnati Enquirer.

Oil in Polk County.

The first crude petroleum struck in Oregon has made its appearance near Monmouth, Polk county, and the predictions of oil experts have thus been verified. The fluid began appearing at the top of the well shortly after a depth of 670 feet had been reached, and efforts have been made to suppress the flow until more land can be secured in the vicinity, but the secret was too good to keep.

The well in question was bored on the Whiteaker farm, three miles from Monmouth, at the expense of H. Hirschberg of Independence. D. M. Watson, of this city, who has been drilling the well declines to give any information on the subject, but would not deny that oil had been struck. Persons posted on the work say that arrangements are being made to pump the water out of the well so as to permit the oil to flow. As the oil is now kept down by a pressure of 100 feet to the inch, only a small portion of it manages to reach the top.
