An unknown writer in last week's Review produces what is supposed to be an answer to an article in the Journal of recent date regarding the Aubrey matter. The writer says that it is not the duty of the protesters to prove Mr. Aubrey guilty. If not then whose? Did not they accuse Mr. Aubrey of being guilty of some kind of an offense? Does this self-constituted jurist wish us to infer that when he makes an accusation against any one that the accused must prove himself innocent? That is the gist of his argument. Does he not know that the law says that the burden of proof lies with the prosecution, in this case persecution? He seems to think that the County Court is a court of inquisition, while in fact it is simply a judicial body. Further there was no proof offered to show that the court had erred in appointing Mr. Aubrey. A protest was filed against his appointment and he filed a sworn statement in rebuttal, which certainly would be taken at any time and by any court preferably to an unsupported statement. If these protesters want Mr. Aubrey removed why did they not appear with proof to substantiate the claims made by them in their protest? The fact of matters is that a clique of foreign "rooters" want Mr. Aubrey, and all other pioneers who have devoted the better part of their lives to the development of their homes, out of the way so that they may be better able to foist their schemes on the public without any protest being made.

So far as republicans are concerned, the state convention refused and neglected to give any heed to the Mays law providing for the nomination of a candidate for United States senator. The object of this law is stated as being to give the people an opportunity to express their choice for senator. The members of the legislature are not bound to pay any attention to such expression; however, had the state convention made a nomination and had that nominee received the full party vote the presumption is that republican members of the legislature would vote for the regular nominee. But suppose a man should now be independently nominated by petition, no matter what vote he might receive, the republican members of the legislature would be under no obligation to vote for him. Being nominated by petition, if the letter of the law is obeyed, the candidate so named cannot get his name upon the official ballot as the republican nominee, for the reason that the republican convention made no nomination.—Salem Sentinel.
