This can only be done by having a delegation there that will work in perfect harmony and one in whom the other members of congress have faith. We would respectfully refer the gentleman to the time when Binger Herman was in congress and he will see that we did not need a democrat to get things for this state. Any state to get recognition must have a delegation in congress that can command the respect of the members and one that will work together as a unit. 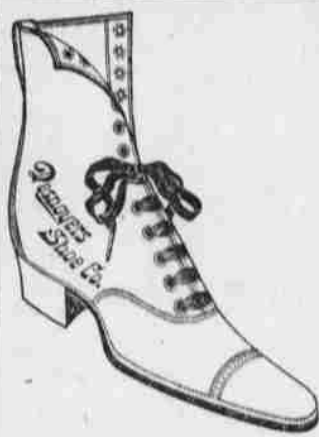
