

**Mining-Claim Surveys.**

Orders have been issued by Surveyor, General Meldrum, for the survey of upwards of 60 mining claims in the mining districts of Baker City, Blue River and Bohemia. Never before have so many claims been ordered surveyed at one time. The commissioner of the general land office has approved the award of contracts for surveys to Homer D. Angel and to Charles L. Campbell, both of The Dalles. Deputy Surveyor Garner is now surveying a township in the Sandy section containing timber land in which Portland capitalists are interested.

**New Legal Lights.**

Earl Sanders returned yesterday from Pendleton, where he had been on examination before the supreme court for admission to practice, with papers in his pocket authorizing him to hang out his shingle as a full fledged lawyer. The other applicants who were successful were Miss Rachael Ray, whom all conceded stood at the head of the class, Messrs. Albert P. Johnson, Woodson L. Patterson, James B. Perry, Robert H. Lloyd and Scott Z. Henderson. The examination given by the supreme court at this session is said to be the most severe ever exacted by the court, and an applicant to stand muster had to be well versed in the rudiments of law.—Dalles Mountaineer.

**Oregon Girl Freed.**

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., May 8.—In the state circuit court, at Watertown today, Mrs. Fayne Moore, of New York City, was granted an absolute divorce from William A. E. Moore. The plaintiff was given the right to resume her maiden name of Fayne Strahan. She instituted her suit on the grounds of extreme cruelty, non-support and conviction of felony. The defendant is serving a term of 19 years in Sing Sing Prison for alleged robbery. He alleges his imprisonment is due to a plot of the plaintiff to get a divorce in order to wed a wealthy Englishman. The plaintiff's father was the late Chief Justice Strahan, of the supreme court of Oregon.

If the Senate steering committee will give the bill a place on the calendar, there is every reason to believe it will become a law. That brisk young chap Morgan, aged 78, is confident and hopeful. He intends to have his bill this trip, or—but there is no "or" with Morgan. He intends to have it.

Parties who are well informed regarding the sheep market say there will be a slump in prices immediately after shearing. They predict that before the season is over yearlings will sell at \$1.25 to \$1.35 per head. Their reason for this prediction is that the markets are well stocked and as summer range is scarce owners will be willing to take what they can get for their surplus stock.—Dalles Mountaineer.
