Snow Slide At Blue River.

EUGENE, May 7.—Information of a tremendous snowslide in the Blue River mining district Saturday has reached Eugene. At noon on that day huge mass of snow and debris started from near the top of Gold Hill and came thundering down the side of the mountain, carrying everything with it. The mouth of the longest tunnel in the Treasure mine, in which an immense rich strike was made recently, lay directly in the path of the avalanche, and the blacksmith shop, a gasoline engine and other machinery and tools were carried to the bottom of the canyon. The mouth of the tunnel is covered with over 60 feet of snow and debris, and it will take many days of hard work and hundreds of dollars to clear it away and repair the damage. Had the slide occurred at any other hour than noontime, when the men were all eating their midday meal, the whole crew of 20 or 30 men would have been killed outright or smothered to death in the tunnel. C. H. Park, the owner of the mine, is now in the East, and he has been notified by telephone of the occurrence.

May Be a Cure for Cholera.

ANN ARBOR, Mich., April 29.—By an expedition to the disease stricken parts of India the effectiveness of benzozone is to be tested. Professor Victor Vaughn and Frederic W. Novy, of the medical college of the university of Michigan will leave for Asia about the middle of June.

Last winter Professor Novy announced the discovery of benzozone, an organic peroxide, which was believed to possess absolute antiseptic powers in the intestinal tract, and which, if that supposition were true, would be not only a cure, but a total preventative of such disease as typhoid, cholera, plague, dysentery and all other diseases, the seat of which is in the intestines.
