Dimes Only Worth 10 Cents.

By conservative estimate there are in Baker County and Eastern Oregon 719 "25th" dimes of the San Francisco mintage of 1893, says the Baker City Herald.

Frank Colton, the Geiser Grand barber, who read in the Herald three weeks ago a dispatch stating that coin collectors were looking for 1893 dimes with an "S" on the obverse, and that a premium of \$5 each were placed on the coins because the Frisco mint issued only 25 of them during that year, is responsible for the estimate.

The explanation is easy. In the original dispatch, either a typographic error occurred, or else the news agency which sent the dispatch to the Herald was misinformed. Most probably the "intelligent compositor" is to blame, and the finger of accusation points directly at the printer who substituted a figure "3" for a "4" in the date. It is thought that 1894 was the year of the rare mintage of dimes at the Frisco mint.

Mr. Colton has another explanation to offer. He says that 1893 dimes with an "S" on the "tail" side are worth \$5 each when the "S" is set sidewise. He has posted an offer of \$5 each for coins of this character.

The error, or the chain of errors, rather, concerning these rare dimes has one good effect. It has caused a great many people to save a number of dimes, who otherwise might have allowed them to slide smoothly over some mahogany bar in return for a foaming stein.

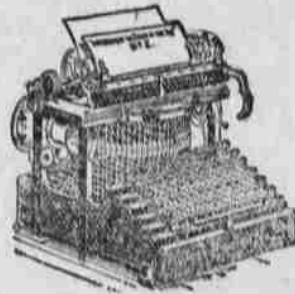
