Shooting Sheep Again.

Word has been received from the sheepmen who are ranging their hands in the foothills that several marauders shot into their bands of sheep and killed several head of the animals, says the Condon Times. George Hardie, of Paper Sack, and W. J. Smith, of Drayfork, are the owners of the bands shot into. The shooting took place last Friday near Buckhorn, in the Lost Valley neighborhood.

Clarence Mallock, who was removing camp for George Hardie in the Buckhorn on Sunday, was haled by five masked men and told to take the sheep and get and keep them off that range or they would do some shooting.

Sheepmen are beginning to realize that they will have to combine if they mean to put a stop to these depredations. We understand they will organize and begin action immediately.

A few of our sheepmen have received a notice from Grant County, where they have formerly run their sheep during the summer, warning them against encroaching on a certain reserve. The notice reads: "All sheepmen who are not residents of Grant County are notified that they are positively forbidden to graze their sheep on the range west of Dixie Butte, between the Middle Fork and the main John Day Rivers. This range is reserved for the use of cattle, and sheep owned by residents of Grant County." The above, which is headed "Notice to Sheepmen," is signed "Taxpayers of Grant County."

18 days without food.

Joe Reyburn recently had an experience that came near costing him his life, say the Antelope Herald. On May 10 he started out on horse back from Shaniko to go to the ranch of James Baxter, at which place he was temporarily stopping. The distance between Baxter's and Shaniko is about 12 or 15 miles. He had gone scarcely more than six or seven miles when his horse stumbled and the saddle cinch broke, hurling Reyburn to the ground. In falling he struck his back a severe blow on a rock, which so injured him that he was unable to move for two days. During this time he was without water or food, and on the second day driven by extreme thirst, he dragged himself down to the mouth of Brush Canyon, a distance of perhaps a mile, for water. From there he worked his way by crawling and dragging himself about a mile farther, where he was when discovered by Ewen McLennan, who chanced to be passing on the 26th of May. For 18 days and nights Mr. Reyburn was without shelter or food, except such roots and herbs as he was able to dig with his hands, and during the unseasonably cold nights between the 10th and the 28th he almost froze. Mr. McLennan says that Reyburn was mere skin and bone when he found him, and was a most pitiful object. Mr. Reyburn is a man close to 70 years of age, and but for an extraordinary vitality would have perished.
