

Bert Peterson, of Milwaukee Or., wagered \$100 that he could hypnotize a ferocious bull in a field. The animal chased Peterson as soon as he approached. Peterson dodged for a while and was finally battered through a high board fence which he attempted to scale. Governor Geer expects to grant a full pardon to Frank Inghram, the convict who, by his timely interference at the prison outbreak last Monday, saved the life of guard Girard. Inghram is serving a life sentence for the murder of his brother in Linn county about ten years ago. In discussing the matter tonight, Governor Geer said: "I think Inghram is deserving of a pardon, and unless some valid reason can be urged against such action, I will probably grant him a full pardon."

William Allen, one of Portland's brave Volunteers, who went to the Philippines with the Second Oregon, died last week at the home of Mrs. Weatherdon, a relative, at 449 Market street, Portland. Young Allen enlisted as a private when the Spanish American War broke out, and he served with the Second Oregon through the entire campaign. He was a victim of consumption, and since his return from Manila has been unable to work. He was born in Canada, and was 21 years old. His mother died about three years ago.

A serious runaway accident occurred to the stage on the Ashland Klamath Falls route on Keene Creek Mountain, 14 miles east of Ashland one morning last week. As the stage, driven by Robert Garret, was coming down the steep mountain grade, the singletree broke and the horses took fright and made a mad plunge down the heavy grade. The driver was thrown to the ground, striking a huge boulder in the fall. He was badly cut about the face and neck and injured internally. He was brought to town for surgical treatment and is in a serious condition.

Ex-President Grover Cleveland has accepted an invitation to speak at the opening of the new Tilden Club on June 19th. There will be 1500 invited guests, among them David B. Hill, William J. Bryan and Richard Onley. This will be Mr. Cleveland's first political speech since his retirement from the presidential office. This is to be a notable gathering of democrats of all shades of political belief and is taken as an effort to harmonize the various discordant elements of the party in order to properly prepare for the battle of 1904.—Ex.
