Secretary Root's recent communication to the Senate contains a significant statement of the gradual reduction of the military forces in the Philippines. In 1891 there were 70,000 American troops in the islands. To-day there are but 23,000 and orders for the return of 5,000 more have been issued. No better evidence of the pacification of the island could be desired.

While President Roosevelt will make an extensive tour of the country early in the fall, he will not indulge in campaign oratory. He will, however, appeal to the people to support him in his contention for Cuban reciprocity, which he regards as involving the national honor and as above partisan politics.

The triumph of having initiated the constitution of the Isthmian canal will belong to the Fifty-seventh Congress, a Congress distinctively republican in both branches. By the terms of the Spooner amendment, should the Panama route prove impracticable, operation will be immediately begun on the Nicaragua route.

Reports received at the State Department indicate that the presence of the United States squadron under the command of Rear-Admiral Crowinshield in various European ports is having the effect of facilitating the work of our European consuls, the presence of so fine a fleet materially increasing the report of the natives for the United States.

Secretary Moody is rapidly confirming the wisdom which lead the President to select for the naval portfolio a man who had for so long and so creditably been associated with the house committee on Naval Affairs. Mr. Moody is putting into practice many of the reforms which he conceived in that capacity.

Governor Gage, of California, has begun action against the San Francisco Call and Los Angeles Times on the charge of criminal libel. Those papers have been ventilating the management of the California penitentiary, and there was no other course open to the governor than to arrest the offending editors or resign. He chose the former, and the courts will now have the opportunity to say who is a liar.

Justice is being done Captain Clark, who sailed the Oregon around the horn during the Spanish-American war. President Roosevelt has nominated the gallant captain as a rear-admiral, and the senate has confirmed the nomination.

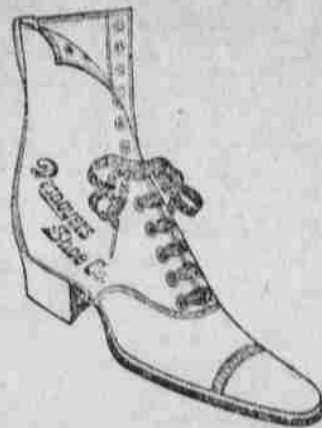
