WAR ON THE RANGE.

Severest Fights Reported Between Cattle and Sheep Owners.

The Blue Mountain Eagle learns that a band of sheep belonging to S. B. Barker, of Condon, Oregon, were shot into on the night of the 18th inst., on what is known as the Big glade on Bear creek on or near the trail to Logan valley. Nothing definite regarding the shooting can be learned. From one source it is learned that about 300 sheep, three pack horses, two dogs were killed and in the scrape a man was shot in the shoulder. The later report may be mistaken since it lacks general confirmation. The place where the shooting occurred was only a short distance from the ranch of F. C. Sels in Bear valley, at which place the firing could be heard distinctly.

A similar affair recently occurred on Rock creek in which W. R. Mascall lost 150 head of ewes, account of which will be found in the Dayville correspondence in this issue.

A rumor has reached this office also that a sheep fight took place recently in the locality of Dixie mountain, in which a number of sheep belonging to nonresident of Grant county were killed.

These sheep troubles have occurred in Grant county for a number of years and will continue to occur until some satisfactory settlement of the range question is made. Resident sheepmen of our counties claim the right to use public range wherever the same is found. Local sheep and cattlemen contend that even though it is government grass, bands from outside counties have no right to be brought into the county, to the detriment of resident stockmen. That they reside in Grant county, pay taxes here, any assist in maintaining a county government, and if any one should be compelled to retire from the stock business, it should be those whose county does not afford ample feed for its bands. That it is not the place of the stock growers of Grant county to go out of business simply to furnish feed for outside stock. That if the public range of Grant county was used exclusively by resident stockmen, there would never be a clash between the owners of cattle and sheep. Whether there is any logic in such reasoning, the Blue Mountain Eagle leaves for its many readers to judge.

One thing is morally certain, the situation is a serious one at present, and is almost sure to result in some one being killed before matters are finally adjusted.—Blue Mt. Eagle.
