

The Railroad as Advertiser.

The ingenuity of railroad advertising men is continually on the qui vive to evolve new and attractive ideas that will draw the attention of the public to their respective lines. If the road can print something that the public must have—or thinks it must—a big point is gained, for it will keep that line before the public. Vast sums of money are annually expended in this direction.

The Northern Pacific every year gets out a special issue of its Wonderland series, which have a real educational value, and have been utilized in schools. Valuable scraps of history are thus preserved. Recently the company has issued an attractive booklet entitled, "Where to Hunt and Fish."

The Great Northern recently put out a very attractive book on "Shooting and Fishing" along its line. This contains a digest of the game laws in the several states through which the line runs. Another attractive bit of advertising matter put out by the line is "Beauty Spot in the Lake Region of Minnesota."

The Canadian Pacific is constantly putting out advertising matter. Its booklets on the Orient by Eliza Scodmore are authoritative and valuable.

The Southern Pacific issues every month a first class magazine called "Sunset." These are beautifully illustrated, and are every month growing better. A specially valuable bit of literature in these days of immigration are the tiny brochures issued by the different Boards of Trade throughout Oregon, which the Southern Pacific is widely circulating. Among those recently issued the ones covering Washington county, Douglas county, Linn county, Benton county and Josephine county may be mentioned.

The Burlington Route is especially prolific in its publications. It issues a hand-book on Colorado; a guide to the Black Hills; Little Journeys in the Black Hills; Mines and Mining in the Black Hills; two books on Nebraska and a monthly agricultural journal entitled, "The Corn Belt." Its book on the Big Horn Basin had an immense circulation and induced heavy immigration. It has put out some valuable matter relating to Oregon.

The Milwaukee has a valuable pocket map which shows up its immense mileage in a most attractive way. The most valuable bit of advertising the company has ever put forth, and that is saying a great deal, is a brochure just out entitled, "The Career and Character of Abraham Lincoln." It is the reprint of an address delivered before the Philosophical Institution of Edinburgh, November 13, 1900, by Joseph H. Choate, United States Ambassador to Great Britain.

The Chicago & Northwestern and the Omaha have ever been fruitful in the way of novel advertising. Its book on Rinehart's Indians was eagerly sought after. Its golf score took well. Another book that was much appreciated in Minnesota, opera-house diagrams of the amusement houses in Minneapolis, St. Paul, Stillwater and Mankato. Its "How to See Minneapolis and St. Paul" is in reality a valuable guide book.

The O. R. & N. Co. has always been at the front in the matter of advertising Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and in fact its book on this subject has been widely circulated and copied from. "How to Start Afresh" is among the latest of its booklets, and this is the most humorous work of the late Colonel P. Donan, who died while the work was in press. His peculiar style is

impressed in every line. "With Nature in Colorado" is a valuable contribution to railroad literature by the Rio Grande System. It is artistic. "Around the Circle" is another really valuable book this line gets out. "Sights, Places and Resorts in the Rockies" is another.

The Illinois Central's "New Orleans for the Tourist" contains much quaint and unusual information regarding this old Southern city. The Wisconsin Central, the Rock Island and in fact every line which finds entrance or is represented here all have enriched the world with literature which, if the public would have to buy, would be treasured up.—Journal.

Attempts to Murder His Wife.

While crazed with drink, William Lockington, a Lower Albino steredore, made a vicious attempt to murder his wife and commit suicide, at their home 504 Northwick street Monday night.

Lockington had been drinking heavily for three days and was in a dangerous mood. He became angered over a trifling dispute with his wife as to the whereabouts of a neighbor, and attacked her with a pocket knife.

The woman ran into the yard and jumped from the stone fence to the sidewalk. He sprang upon her and attempted to slash her throat. She broke away and ran to the house of a near neighbor named Olink, who having heard the scuffle, appeared and hit Lockington on the head with a piece of gas pipe.

The woman then ran across the street to a boarding house where she was overtaken by the enraged husband, who cut her three or four times on the cheek, shoulders and wrist. The wounds inflicted are not serious.

After the attempted murder Lockington walked up the street a short distance and made an attempt at self destruction by jabbing the knife into his throat. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital in the patrol wagon. He is in a serious condition and if he recovers will have to answer to the charge of assault with attempt to kill.—Journal.

Fight for Speaker.

A very interesting fight is on for speakership of the next House. There are three candidates in the field—Frank Davey of Marion county, L. T. Harris of Lane and B. L. Eddy, who has the joint interests of Yamhill and Tillamook counties in his care. Davey is a newspaper man at Salem and had the distinction of leading his ticket at the election. While it appears he is making some effort to be known at the next session as "Mr. Speaker," his candidacy is not really being considered seriously and it is believed he would be perfectly willing to draw out of the main contest if assured first place on the House committee of ways and means. The real fight will be between Harris and Eddy. Both were members of the House two years ago; both were personally active in everything they undertook and before the session of 1901 was much more than half over it was apparent that Harris and Eddy were always in evidence when any measure of importance was under consideration and generally on the same firing line. Both are well thought of and have many friends, but the chances of success seem to favor Eddy, it being claimed that he has received assurances of a sufficient number of the House members to make his election a certainty.—Journal.

Shocking Death of Unknown Hobo.

WOODBURN, Aug. 2.—An unknown man, apparently about 18 years old, was killed here this morning as he was riding on the break beam of the last coach of the northbound overland that left here at 6:17. He had evidently slipped and was caught in the right side by a beam, while his feet dragged nearly two miles before the train-

men were attracted by the car crushing stones that were thrown on the track.

The man had no doubt died by inches. Both feet were broken and mangled at the heels, one leg was badly cut, the forehead crushed in, part of the skull from the back of the head and the brains being found along the track. In the right side was a gaping wound made by the instrument that held the body fast. The man's clothing was stripped from him and strewn along the track, the only thing left on him being the neckband of a shirt, which remained around his neck. The wearing apparel picked up consisted of two overshirts, one undershirt, trousers, overalls, socks, a pair of new shoes and a black cap. The only articles found in the clothes were two small keys on a ring and three nickels. One tooth is missing from the man's mouth. He had a smooth face, prominent features, dark hair, was of medium build, and five feet six inches in height. The body will be buried in Belle Pass Cemetery this afternoon. Coroner Clough arrived from Salem on the Albany local and decided that no inquest was necessary.
